POSSIBILITIES
DRESSED POULTRY
TRADE STRESSED

Experimental Farm's Poultry Field Day One of Most Successful Ever Held — Various Speakers Declare for Development of Industry.

The Dominion Experimental Station's 14th annual poultry field day came to a close here yesterday afternoon, special addresses featuring the concluding session. A. R. Jones, manager of the Maritime Co-operative Egg and Poultry Exchange, at Saint John, delivered an address stressing the possibilities in the dressed poultry trade with Great Britain. He declared there were great opportunities there for the poultry producers of this province. He emphasized, however, that New Brunswick producers must keep in mind two things—a high quality and a steady supply.

Also with an eye to British, Allen G. McAvity, of Saint John told of experiments which he had conducted in raising birds for meat purposes with the British market in view. He saw great possibilities in such a trade.

Hon. A. C. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture, spoke briefly in welcome of the poultrymen and wished them success. He offered the support of the provincial department of agriculture in any proposition in which it could help them.

At the field day, the most successful yet held, prize winners in a poultry judging competition were as follows: First, Ernest Jarvis, Stanley; second, Ashley Pringle, Stanley; third, Mrs. Norman Lord, Rollingdam; fourth, Louis A. Kerr, Stanley, and fifth, Murray Speight, Welsford. The competition was carried on from 9 A. M. to 3 P. M., under the direction of John Rankine, of the Experimental Station staff, and W. H. McGibbon, assistant provincial poultry superintendent.

More than 300 were in attendance. At the afternoon general meeting, C. F. Bailey, superintendent of the Experimental Station, presided and extended a welcome. He urged the young people to attend the annual short course of the New Brunswick Agricultural School at the Experimental Station, and, if they wished to go further in agricultural education, to attend the Nova Scotia Agricultural College at Truro.

Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, minister of health and labor, on behalf of Premier A. A. Dymally, presented the W. H. Thorne & Co., Ltd., silver trophy to Lloyd McKinney, Gagetown, whose pens won the provincial egg-laying contest which ended last October.

Prof. J. P. Landry, poultryman at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College, gave a general talk on poultry management of the farm flock and praised the high quality of the New Brunswick stock.

F. Leslie Wood, provincial poultry superintendent, reported on a poultry convention which he attended last week at Durham, New Hampshire which was a meeting of technical poultrymen from the United States and Canada, with representatives present from 30 states and five provinces. A new breed had been developed in New Hampshire known as the "New Hampshire Red". Mortality in chick and pullet flocks had been discussed considerably at the convention, Mr. Wood said, and he applied these talks to New Brunswick conditions.

A poultry plucking demonstration by a wax method brought the day's proceedings to a close. It was conducted by Dr. N. H. Grace, of the National Research Council, Ottawa and Merle Mitchell of the Dominion Livestock Branch, Ottawa.
