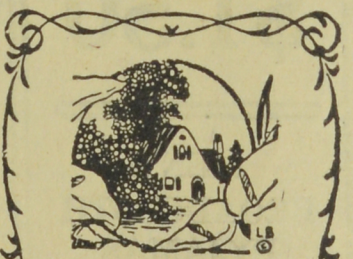

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LADY LUCK FORSAKES THE SCHOOLBOY

Detroit's problem child of two years ago, Lyn Rowe, has developed into the American League mystery. From the ranking pitcher of the circuit in 1934 the Schoolboy has staggered downhill until today he is regarded as a risk every time he goes to the mound. Pennant chances of the Tigers hang on Rowe's arm and the tea is beginning to lack confidence in the spark plug of a year ago.

As the Tigers turned into August last year their big Arkansas pitcher was the toast of the circuit. Fans of the country followed him as he rolled up victory after victory until he had registered sixteen in a row to equal the best feats of the league's great hurlers of other days.

For the big green kid of the Arkansas firehouse things have changed a lot. Tailors make Rowe's clothes to order. The Detroit treasurer writes out the largest check ever paid to a Tiger hurler. Rowe has affluence, a home with a wife he adores and a baby he idolizes.

Luck Passes as Cush Arrives
The old sandlot luck has deserted the big pitcher. Those breaks that mean the difference between a mound master and a second stringer pass him by Rooters are chilly to him. Rowe frets and worries. He is disappointed in himself, but to a man the Tigers are for him. They acquire leads for Lyn and hit hard as in the days when he was a 3 to 1 shot to beat the enemy. He hears the hoots and howls of the fans in enemy ball parks, but through it all he presses on trying to beat his hard luck.

Rowe Needs Confidence

Rowe has not been walking to the mound with the sure spirit he displayed in his stellar season of 1934. Before his time the old mound masters felt the sting of having their ears pinned back by batters, as the diamond lingo has it.

No more confident hurler ever faced a batter than Wes Farrell. Suddenly his arm gave him trouble. He did not care to face the good hitters, so he became an outfielder. Then he realized that his arm was all right, but he had to learn some new pitching tricks. Ferrell, who had been a sensation in the league, made himself over. Today he relies less on smoke than he ever did in his glory days, but he says quite frankly that while the enemy may hit him harder he is a better pitcher than when he was an Indian. Victory has brought back his confidence.

Cochrane says that Rowe will come back like Ferrell. He may even strike a winning streak that will put the Tigers under the wire first this year.

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
