BOY SCOUTS IN
THE DOMINION

Brig.-General F. W. Hill Speaks Before Cathedral Men's Club—Asks Support of Citizens and Clergy.

Brig.-General F. W. Hill, vice-president of the Provincial Boy Scout Association and president of Fredericton district, in addressing the Cathedral Men's Club last evening at the Cathedral Memorial Hall on the Scout movement in Canada, made an appeal to the citizens at large for support of the Earl of Bessborough's plea to have the Boy Scout enrollment in the Dominion increased from 65,000 to 100,000.

Brig.-General Hill pointed out the value of the Boy Scout movement and said that it was desirable as training for Canadian youth. He asked the support of the citizens, declaring that a large percentage of the Scout Association throughout Canada was allied to religious denominations. The movement had the endorsement of the clergy of all denominations as well as officials of the country. The Fredericton president's address lasted for half an hour and was very interesting. Afterwards he was extended a hearty vote of thanks on his fine address.

H. W. Woods acted as chairman. from scout training not only to the individual but to the community and even the nation itself. He further brought out the fact that the extension of the movement was only a question of qualified leaders and spoke enthusiastically of the course for leaders recently opened in this city, paying well merited tribute to the work done by Prof. Pugh, Alvah Good and others in this district. Speaking of the Governor General's challenge as to increased membership, General Hill spoke encouragingly of its being fully met as Canada's welcome to the Scout leader of the world—Lord Baden Powell on his forthcoming visit. The enthusiastic resolution of thanks extended to General Hill voiced the appreciation of the Club members. Play was then resumed in the cumulative card tournament. The evening's score showed General Hill to be a good bridge player as well as a clever speaker as he led the contract division while Harry Ryan was high man among the forty-five players. The usual light refreshments, followed by the National Anthem brought to a close still another instructive and enjoyable evening for the Cathedral Men's club.

Old Times Recalled

Rev. Dr. F. A. Wightman who is an author and an historical writer of considerable note has prepared the following interesting paper on "New Brunswick Boundary Disputes and Changes. The Daily Mail publishes the same at the request of some interested students of history. As an historical document it should be valuable.

NEW BRUNSWICK'S BOUNDARY DISPUTES AND CHANGES.

(By Rev. Dr. F. A. Wightman)

(Continued from yesterday)

To quote Ganong again: "Quebec claimed as far South as a line starting at Mars Hill (on the Maine border) and running South and East of the Tobique and Upsalquitch Rivers to the mouth of the Restigouche. Plainly, no agreement could be reached between the provinces themselves and in 1846, at the suggestion of the Right Honorable W. E. Gladstone, then Secretary of State for the Colonies, a commission was appointed to investigate the claims of the provinces and to suggest a line."

"After a thorough examination of the question and a consideration of numerous proposed lines, the Commission recommended a compromise line intended to split the difference between the two claims. This line was to be a continuation of the International line between Maine and Quebec, until it intersected the parallel of 47 degrees and 50 minutes N. Lat. which it was to follow to the Kedgwick River and thence by the Kedgwick and Restigouche to the Bay of Chaleur." "But this line pleased neither province, lease of all Quebec, and in 1851 the matter was referred to etill another Commission whose third member was Dr. Stephen Lushington of London. Dr. Lushington took the line of the previous Commission as a basis, but finding that Quebec was particularly aggrieved because the old Seignories of Temiscouata and Madawaska, which it anciently possessed, had been awarded to New Brunswick, he restored them to Quebec, giving New Brunswick, as compensation, the land between the Kedgwick and the

Patapedia. Thus was the first part of the line fixed. I. e. the part twelve miles long which crosses the Madawaska at right angles, this being the precise southern boundary of the old Seignory of Madawaska. This, then, became the key to the whole situation.

Then, to give the upper Saint John to New Brunswick (though Quebec had claimed all west of the continued north line) a line was run from the old Seignory line approximately parallel with the river and passing one mile south of Long Lake," placing this lake wholly within Quebec, but giving Baker Lake to New Brunswick, except its extreme northern tip. From near the southern end of Long Lake, by forming a slight angle, the line continued to the outlet of Beau Lake, the chief lake on the St. Francis River. This, with the St. Francis River, formed New Brunswick's northwestern boundary and explains the existence of the narrow "pan-handle" averaging about ten miles wide by thirty miles long, forming New Brunswick's northwestern extremity.

To complete this northern boundary we now turn to the eastern end of the original Seignorial line, already mentioned as crossing the Madawaska River at right angles and, about six miles east of the river. From this point the line was to run due north some twenty-six miles, then due east, about fourteen miles, then due north again some six miles, or until it intersected the 48th parallel of latitude. This arrangement, in a general way, followed the tangent lines of the watersheds separating waters of the Rimouski, Green River and the Restigouche and explains the several right angle changes in the boundary in that region. From the point where it intersects the 48 parallel it continues on this line due east until it reaches the Patapedia river, which then forms the boundary till it joins the Restigouche which then becomes the boundary till it enters the Bay Chaleur.

As previously stated, this line was a compromise arrangement in its entire course, not giving entire satisfaction to either Quebec or New Brunswick, but was accepted by both parties as being the most satisfactory of others previously offered. Considering the previous extravagant claims of Quebec, it would appear that the boundary Commission was fairly generous to New Brunswick, though we have always felt that Temiscouata Lake should belong to us.

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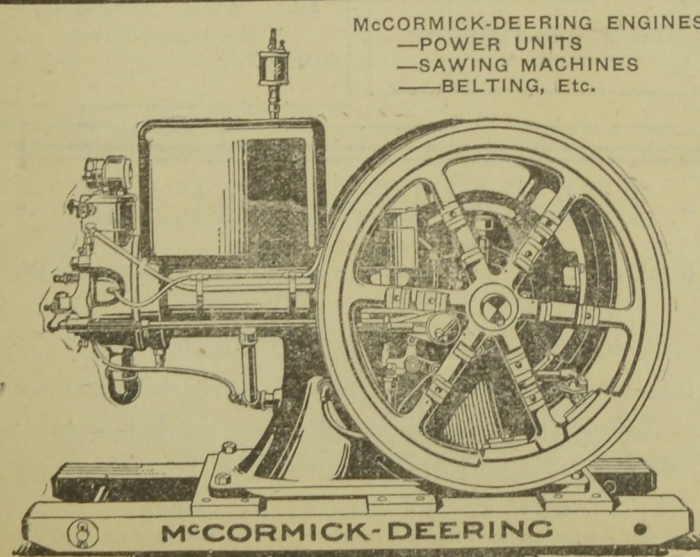
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
