Largest Meeting in Recent Years; Spirit of Optimism

Finances Good

Pastor Stresses Need for Co-operation in All Depts. of Church

The annual meeting of the Brunswick Street Baptist church was held last evening in the vestry with the minister, Rev. G. W. Guion presiding. In the absence of R. B. Wallace, W. S. Hall acted as secretary. The meeting was the largest held in years and there was a very marked spirit of optimism, goodwill prevailing. In all departments encouraging reports were given.

The pastor, Rev. G. W. Guion, presented his annual statement which drew attention to two main problems, first the co-ordinating of the work of the various organizations and second, that of pastoral care with definite suggestions on these matters for the future.

The financial reports showed total receipts from all sources to be \$13,028.13. Of this amount the total for all missionary work was \$3,196.10 and the amount of \$916.76 was raised by the auxiliary and benevolent funds for local work.

Biggest 1934 Catch

A.S. Weill, Philadelphia, Caught Prize Trout For Year

Winners of the challenge trophies awarded annually by the New Brunswick Guides' Association for best salmon and trout caught by non-resident anglers while fishing with members of the Association during 1934 were announced today.

Charles D. L. Harrison of Green's Farms, Connecticut, is the 1934 winner of the salmon trophy; and Alfred S. Weill, of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, is winner of the trout trophy. Both trophies will be on display in the New Brunswick exhibit at the New England Sportsmen's and Boat Show, Mechanics Hall, Boston, during the week of February 2nd, to 9th.

At the time of making his prize catch late last August, young Harrison counted his age as sixteen years. The salmon, when taken from the water, was 43 inches long and measured 25 inches in girth. Its weight was 33 pounds and 7 ounces. The salmon took the fly at the mouth of Clearwater Brook, a tributary of the Southwest Miramichi River and required 2 hours and 20 minutes to land.

His First Experiment

The trip was Harrison's first experiment in salmon angling. He came to New Brunswick in the company of Dr. and Mrs. Robert A. Cook and Robert A. Cook, Jr., of New York City. During their stay the party were guests of Fred Fairley, guide and outfitter of Boiestown, and under Fairley's direction the younger Cook and young Harrison made the trip down the Southwest Miramichi from Half Moon Cove to Boiestown. The two young anglers made the trip in easy-going style and had camped and fished several days at the mouth of Clearwater Brook where Fairley has a well equipped sporting camp. The party was just about ready to move along down stream when Harrison got his big strike.

Strangely enough, the season's record trout was caught in the same week that saw the big salmon brought to gaff. The exact date was September 2nd and Mr. Weill who made the catch, was fishing Governor's Pool on the Nepisiguit River at the time. He was a guest at the lodges of Bert Moore of Andover and Fred Long, of Fredericton was guiding Mr. Weill, when the catch was made. The prize trout weighed four pounds and two ounces when caught, was 22 1/2 inches in length and 11 1/4 inches in girth.
