Thirteen years ago Mr. and Mrs. Kilburn and family moved to California, where Mr. Kilburn later passed away.

The Daily Mail is in receipt of a letter from a man who visited Fredericton during the recent A. and B. Club regatta. He has the highest praise for Alderman Fred Mundle, H. W. Woods, president of the A. & B. Club, His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark and others who exhibited so much community spirit and extended such a nice welcome to the visitors.

The writer states that he would like through The Daily Mail—which he is kind enough to say is "recognized as the home community paper which has a community spirit"—to express his appreciation of what he saw.

He says that the section of the city in which the sports were held and from that down past the Cathedral is the "prettiest spot in the Maritimes". 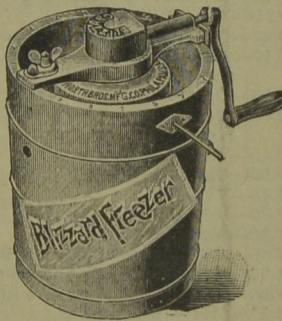
