PROROGATION MAY OCCUR NEXT WEEK

OTTAWA, June 24—The Parliamentary week ends with an atmosphere of uncertainty hanging over a seemingly common desire to get through. Prorogation may occur next Saturday, or it may not. It is over only a few subjects that contention arises, but the few—one in particular—are important. It deals with the grain problem which is often referred to as a half-billion dollar affair. The question here is mainly as to the powers of the board, whether they should be compulsory or on more elastic lines. Added to it is the question of most acute controversy, concerning the propriety at this state of revealing all the inner workings, in the last four years, of the Government-created agency for stabilizing the wheat market. On this matter the division of the opinion is very marked. The Prime Minister is insistent that this is not the time to go into that, while the Opposition members on the committee maintain that it is. There were signs of ruffled tempers as the committee terminated four hours of continuous sitting Saturday. The matter will be decided one way or the other, today.

CARDINAL WARNS AGAINST "HEALER"

QUEBEC, June 24—Semaine Religieuse, official diocesan weekly bulletin contains notice from His Eminence the Cardinal disavowing a citizen who is alleged to have distributed cards alleging his ability to cure ills and infirmities through prayer. Besides being disavowed as a superstitious person and a suspect of heresy, the man complained of is denounced by the Cardinal Archbishop.

225,000 IN ONTARIO ON RELIEF PROJECTS

TORONTO, June 24—With an estimated 225,000 unemployed working on municipal projects under the Ontario Government's cash relief plan, Hon. David A. Croll, Minister of Public Welfare, announced \$5,789,768.70 out of a total of \$8,188,085.15 approved, had been paid out for labor. More than 200 projects have been approved, the Minister announced, adding prevailing wages were being paid.

KINGSTON, Ont., June 24—Oscar Patterson, of Relief Camp No. 42, Barrie field was sentenced to 10 days in jail in police court on a charge of taking a book from the Kingston public library without having a card. Patterson said he was so intensely interested in the book, "The Riddle of Jutland," that he forgot himself at closing time, put the book under his coat and started for the camp. He declared he did not intend to steal the book.

SLANDER WRIT SERVED

The much discussed writ charging J. B. McNair with slander in connection with a recent political speech, was served upon him Saturday here.

The slander suit was brought by D. Leo Dolan. The case will be taken up at the September term, York court sittings.

ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH HOLDS FINE SERVICES

Great enthusiasm marked the four-fold Anniversary in Saint Andrew's Presbyterian Church yesterday at both services. In the morning Dr. Ross reviewed the years since 1925 and told of the progress and development of the Presbyterian Church in Canada since that year of Disruption. The present church building was erected and dedicated in 1927. Among the leaders at that time were the late Col. Logie and Mr. Justice Crockett now of the Supreme Court of Canada. The past ten years have been of marked progress and the liberality of the congregation has been outstanding. Saint Andrew's Church has a prominent place among the new churches built since 1925. The total contributions for all purposes by the Presbyterian Church in Canada during the past year has been three and a quarter millions of dollars. Over five million dollars have been paid in the purchase and building of new churches since the disruption of 1925 when Presbyterians lost so much property and membership.

The Diamond Jubilee of the Church which is being observed everywhere this year was given prominence in Saint Andrew's Church yesterday and the same form of thanksgiving and consecration used at the recent General Assembly was part of the service. As the declaration of thanksgiving and the renewal of consecration was read by the minister the congregation rose and responded with the choir and organ in assent thereto.

It was also observed that one hundred and three years have passed since the founding of the first Presbyterian Church in Fredericton known as "The Kirk." Special reference was made to the leaders in church work in the years gone by and a prayer of thanksgiving was offered for their spirit of devotion and sacrifice and the rich legacy of their spirit and their work bequeathed to Saint Andrew's as a birthright which none might sell.

At the evening service Dr. Ross chose as his text: "Give diligence to make your calling and election sure." He referred to the high and honoured place to which the Presbyterian Church has been called and reminded his hearers that the great doctrine of Election set forth in the Word of God signified not merely the call of God to a position of honour and privilege but preeminently to that of respectability, and that the due observance of these anniversaries would find highest and best expression in every member and adherent realizing his and her individual responsibility.

The choir, under the direction of Mr. Robyn Bayley rendered several appropriate solos and anthems and the whole day proved worthy of so historic a celebration.
