

CHILDREN LOST 22 HOURS AT HARVEY

Four Children of Sterling Rosborough At Acton Found

Found Under Barn

Police and Crew of Men Engaged in Search; Hid From Fear

Four children, the eldest of them only eleven years of age, were discovered hidden under the floor of a barn at Acton, in the Harvey area yesterday by a party of searchers. The four boys, sons of Sterling Rosborough of Acton, were huddled together and suffering from hunger and exposure when discovered.

The children had been missing from their home since 5.30 o'clock on Saturday afternoon and had had nothing to eat since that time. Lance Corporal L. P. Ryder of the R.C.M.P. here, was in charge of a searching party of about 250 men, who were engaged all day Sunday. While the woods about the Rosborough home were scoured and every place in that vicinity ransacked for some trace, the boys were only a few paces from their own kitchen. When one of the search party discovered their whereabouts by the merest of coincidence, the boys were so weakened by hunger and exposure that they could not speak.

Abuse, Perhaps

Police intimated today that the lads had hidden by their own will, and that they appeared to be fearful of something. The possibility of ill-treatment is being investigated.

Dr. H. B. Dougan of Harvey rendered medical attention and advised a light diet and care for the children, to ensue for the next few weeks. Douglas is the name of the eldest child.

Daylight Saving Time Underway In Fredericton

Fredericton business men and institutions generally began their day's work today on Daylight Saving Time. The new time officially went into effect at midnight on Saturday when the city hall clock was moved ahead one hour, and citizens placed their time-pieces ahead also. The result today was that people accustomed to going to work at nine o'clock really went to work at eight o'clock. For those who usually go to work at seven or eight o'clock the new time forces them to get up at a very early hour.

While most of those living in this city will regulate their work and play by the new hours there are some who will stick to the old regime for the summer months. Marysville had unanimously voted against the new time. Devon is holding a special meeting early this week to decide whether to adopt or reject Daylight Saving Time. It is most important to Devon since the proximity of the two places and the time adjustment may have its difficulties. The Provincial Government federal officials here, all will operate under Daylight time. The various banks, the factories at the rear of the town, and most of the business firms all will operate under the new time schedule for the summer months. It is understood that the Victoria Mill of Fraser Companies, Limited, will have a plebiscite among its employees to see whether the new time will be adopted or not.

The railways are on the old time and the Post Office mails will open and close as usual, and in accordance with the railway schedules.

NINETEEN VOTED AT THE ADVANCE POLL

First Advance Poll Was Opened at York Co. Court House

Another Tuesday

Preparations for Polling At 19 Places Here on Thursday

As New Brunswick's election date nears returning officers and their deputies are busily engaged in the preparations of polls and other matters incidental to election day.

The first advance poll was opened in the York County court house on Saturday evening, and nineteen people took advantage of this opportunity. The purpose of an advance poll is to permit railwaymen, commercial travellers, sailors and fishermen who reside in this city, Marysville or Devon and who are unable to go home on election day, to cast their vote. Polling at the court house was done between 7 P. M., and 10 P. M.

Another advance poll will be held on Tuesday evening at the court house. Election day is Thursday when the citizens will cast their ballots.

Fredericton will have a total of nineteen polling places, ten uptown and nine downtown.

On the air tomorrow night, E. C. Atkinson, government candidate for Sunbury will discuss issues of the campaign.


