Another vivid episode in the romantic adventures of "Diane and Her Life Saver", starring Rhoda Arnold, soprano and Alfred Drake, baritone, with Lucille Wall and John Griggs in leading dramatic roles, will be broadcast over the nationwide WABC-Columbia network tonight from 9:00 to 9:15 P. M., A. S. T.

The action will be centered about Diane's persistent attempts to discover the identity of the mysterious and attractive stranger who has rescued her from several trying situations. The musical highlights of the program will feature Rhoda Arnold singing "What Is This Thing Called Love?" and Alfred Drake's interpretation of "If You Were the Only Girl in the World". As their closing number Drake and Miss Arnold will feature Cole Porter's new song hit, "You're the Top". The Meyer Davis Orchestra will be conducted by John Mundy.

Kate Smith Presents Her Boston Winners

The two audition winners from Boston—Louise Beach, lyric soprano, and Raymond Eaton, baritone—will be presented by Kate Smith on her New-Star Revue over the WABC-Columbia network tonight at 9:30 to 10:00 P. M., A. S. T. On this program, Kate herself, accompanied by Jack Miller's Orchestra, will sing "Blue Moon", "O Promise Me", and "I Get a Kick Out of You".

Eaton, for whom Kate predicts a successful future as a singer, has had a more remarkable career than any auditionist so far uncovered in the Hudson tryouts. Unable to complete his high school education at Glens Falls, New York, through necessity of supporting his family, he got a job in the rolling mills in Danvers. He married at 18 and was with the 102nd Field Artillery during the war, remaining in the service for three years after the Armistice. In 1921, he drove a truck. Then he became a farmer, later turning to music. In 1929, he was winner of first prize of \$500 given by the National Federation of Music Clubs in Boston.

Like Eaton, Miss Beach also holds a singing prize, having won the Atwater Kent auditions at Burlington for the State of Vermont several years ago. She is a native of Detroit, but has been making her home in Boston for some time. The young soprano is a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music and several select finishing schools.

Miss Beach will sing "You Are Free" on Monday's program and Eaton's song will be "Wagon Wheels".

M., A. S. T. Block and Sully will come to the microphone armed with their particular brand of humor, while Gertrude Niesen will offer blues numbers. Lud Gluskin and his Continental Orchestra round out the program with dance tunes.

Studio Stories

Now it's "Roxy Grandpa," instead of Foxy Grandpa" For Roxy, the popular showman, is a grandfather for the first time, a fact in which he takes more pride than in all his radio and stage successes. The new arrival in the family is John Bijur, born last week. His mother is Roxy's daughter Beta.

Another vital statistic concerns CBS maestro Richard Himber, although indirectly. He's just received a card from Johnstown, N.Y., announcing the birth of Richard Himber Antell, named in his honor because the maestro helped along the romance of the young couple something over a year ago when they were drifting apart. In answer to the young man's request, Himber, the couple's favorite orchestra leader, played their favorite tune, "Goodnight, Sweetheart," to help re-unite them. Seems to have worked.

Control engineer Irving Reis had a big moment in a recent "Buck Rogers" program when the script called for such fast character changes that an additional actor was needed for a few lines to avoid a mechanical hazard. So Irving spoke the lines without moving from his dials in the control room. The engineer also has doubled in another phase of radio—as the author of a number of promising dramatic scripts.

Announcer Kenneth Robert's mother, attending a recent "Hour of Charm" broadcast by Phil Spitalny's all-girl ensemble was surprised to find, in the next seat, the man who taught her to play the piano as a boy. "Why, Kenneth is the announcer of this program," she informed him proudly. "And my daughter is the 'celist," the tutor replied. His 'cello-playing daughter is the talented Mila Wellerson of the Spitalny ensemble.

Stars of Silent Films Join Bernie

HOLYWOOD, Jan. 28—Five famous movie stars of the old silent film days, one of the largest groups of similar prominence ever brought to the air together, will be introduced by Ben Bernie Tuesday, January 29, during his Pabst Blue Ribbon program over an NBC-WFAF network at 10:00 P. M., A. S. T.

Charles Ray, Viola Dana, William Farnum, Clara Kimball Young and Bryant Washburne will gather around the microphone with the Old Maestro that night in a "Round Table of Silent Stars" to talk over the old pre-radio days and anything else which happens to come to mind.

Bernie and all the lads will provide the musical portion of the broadcast, which will originate in the NBC Hollywood studios. The program is sponsored by the Premier Pabst Sales Company.
