

PETTIGROVE AND O'DONNELL WIN COUNCIL SEATS

Of 283 Qualified Voters, 232 Voted in Marysville Saturday

Mayor Unopposed

Couns. Gregory, Finnamore, Moore and Sloat Have One More Year

Alderman H. R. Pettigrove was re-elected Saturday as a member of the Marysville town council for Ward 1 when he defeated J. L. Fletcher, his opponent for the seat on the council board, by 44 votes. The votes were 133 to 94. The result gives Alderman Pettigrove his seat on the town council for another term of two years. Howard O'Donnell defeated Alderman William Moore in Ward 3 by 32 votes, the ballots standing at 132 to 100.

Great community interest was taken in the election and the qualified numbers of voters was 283. Out of the 283 232 went to the polls, 132 on the east side of the Nashwaak River and 100 on the west side.

Mayor Unopposed

Mayor J. Walter Walker was re-elected by acclamation for his fifth consecutive one-year term at the helm of Marysville civic politics. Alderman Ritchie Gorman and Alderman Marvin W. Minne were also unopposed in their respective Wards, 2 and 4.

The members of the council were declared elected and sworn in at the town hall by the town clerk and treasurer, Norman C. Cochrane. The mayor and the elected candidates addressed a large gathering after the swearing in.

The new Marysville town council will hold its first meeting on February 11. There are four aldermen who have yet one year of their two year terms to serve. They are Irvine Gregory, Charles Finnamore, Roy Moore and Charles Sloat.

LABOR FEDERATION MEET HERE

A large representation from the various unions is expected to the meeting which will probably last three days.

COLDEST SNAP OF SEASON STRIKES NEW BRUNSWICK

Temperatures of 52 Below at Florenceville to 17 Below at St. John

Capital 23 and 30 Below

Most Severe Along the St. John River Valley; Cold at Campbellton

Old Jack Frost spread his shadow over the Province of New Brunswick today and caused thermometers to drop to a record low mark for this winter. The cold snap ranging in severity from 52 degrees below zero in Florenceville, Carleton Co., to 17 below in Saint John was general throughout the province and thus far this winter's thermometers had not dropped to such a depth.

In Fredericton the lowest temperature recorded was 30 degrees below zero, in the city, although the official temperature registered at the University of New Brunswick meteorological department was 23 degrees below zero.

Plumbers and pipe-fitters were busy all day today repairing water pipes damaged by the sudden invasion of cold weather, but as the sun rose the thermometers registered slowly rising temperatures and at noon the average temperature in the city was between zero and one below.

The cold snap was most severe along the St. John River Valley, the lowest temperature being recorded at Florenceville, 52 below. On the North Shore the temperature ranged from 40 below at Campbellton to 26 below at Bathurst. The temperatures recorded at the various centres in the province were: Andover, 46 below; Edmundston, 42 below; Grand Falls, 44 below; Hartland, 46 below; Florenceville, 52 below; Woodstock, 40 below;

ANOTHER GRADE V. DEPARTMENT FOR YORK ST. SCHOOL

39 In Class

Move Necessary to Absorb Overflow of Grade V. Departments

A new grade V department of 39 pupils in the York Street school opened today with Miss Netta MacMillan of Stanley as the teacher. The department was opened by the Fredericton School Board for the purpose of absorbing the overflow of pupils in the Grades V in the various schools of the city.

This year there has been a particularly heavy enrollment in the Grades V in the city schools and it was found necessary to form another class, Miss MacMillan, who is from Stanley, was appointed teacher for the department, although there were several applicants whose people have been paying taxes in Fredericton for many years.

Miss MacMillan has been assisting with the class for the past week or ten days, but the furniture for the classroom was not installed until Saturday in readiness for the opening of the classroom today. There is a fairly large class made up of 39 pupils taken from the various grades V in the city and it is a necessary move on the part of the School Board in forming the class.

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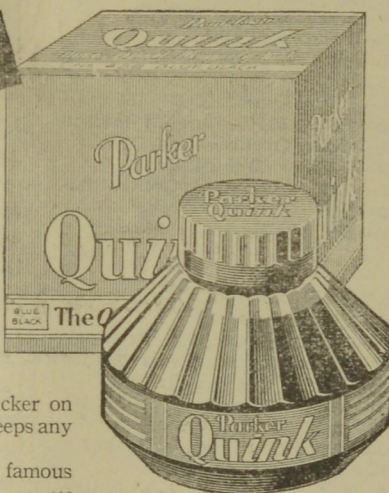
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
