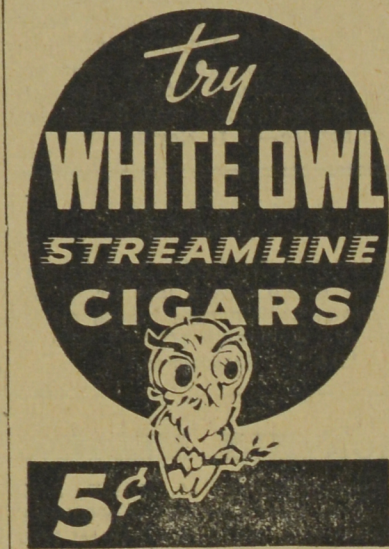
Boston Cubs Take Opener From Bruins By 3-2 Score

SAINT JOHN, N. B., October 26—
The Cubs, farmteam of the Boston
Bruins of the National Hockey League
for the second successive year took
the annual pre-season game from the
N.H.L. club to usher in the hockey
season at the Forum here last night,
3-2.

Bauer, first line rightwinger of the
Cubs, sank the winning marker, when
he took a rebound of Carrigans shot
which pulled Thompson out of the
cage. He took advantage of the second
or two it took Thompson to get back

A dull first period was offset as the
teams opened up in the second, the
Cubs outscored the Bruins 2-1.

Action did not commence until the
third line of the Bruins started to out-

Halifax Wolverine outfit.

It was a tame game for a season
opener but the teams have not hit
their full stride yet and it is expected
that the Bruins-Canadiens game Mon-
day night will bring out more action.

**INTERNATIONAL
TENNIS IS IN
BAD MIXUP**

NEW YORK, Oct. 25—International
tennis affairs are far from settled.
Discontent is evident upon the surface
of the Davis Cup situation. Some are
so bold as to predict that the famous
trophy may become the tombstone of
the amateur game. Sir F. Gordon
Lowe, an English Davis cup player of
two decades ago, recently bluntly pro-
pounded the question: Are the pro-
fessionals on their way to displace the
amateurs and so rule tennis?

Amateur regulations, proposed to
cure the increasing discontent, must
be wrestled with by the International
Federation. It is a ticklish situation
right now for the Americans, as to
kick over the traces and withdraw
would leave the country a tennis out-
law.

The Davis cup matches next year
return to the old basis of a free-for-all
with no stand out nations. What after
that? The Anglo-Saxon clique—Great
Britain, Canada, South Africa, Aus-
tralia and others—support the proposal
to hold the tournament as a biennial
affair. This would curtail the expense,
now irksome to some nations, and
likewise help the amateur tourna-
ments on the homeland courts now suf-
fering to an alarming extent. While
the United States Lawn Tennis As-
sociation has emphatically opposed
this plan, the desperate plight of tour-
naments in this country, their dwind-
ling appeal and the lack of class com-
petition may possibly bring about a
change.

Most of the fans at the game Thursday were rather disappointed at the
result. It looks as though we had it pretty well figured out by the scores of
previous games, but we never dreamed that Mt. A. and U.N.B. could put up
such a terrible exhibition of rugby—many thought it was the worst Mt. A.
U.N.B. game that was ever played.

It was a game in which the bad points of rugby jutted out all over
every play that was made by both teams. The U.N.B. three-quarter line
looked like a row of glass statues and the Mt. A. backs did a fairly fine
job of scattering the glass all over the field every chance they got. There
was no doubt as to the superiority of Mt. A. as a team Thursday, but they
were probably at their best, which is none too good, and U.N.B. put up the
worst show that a team wearing the Red and Black has ever put on.

game at Sackville next Saturday with that gameness and skill of which

than they displayed here yesterday—judging from their past games yes-
terday's performance was the best they have put on this year. Anyway it
looks like a tough battle, and whichever way you look at it the game at Mt.
A. could not help but be the better of the two.

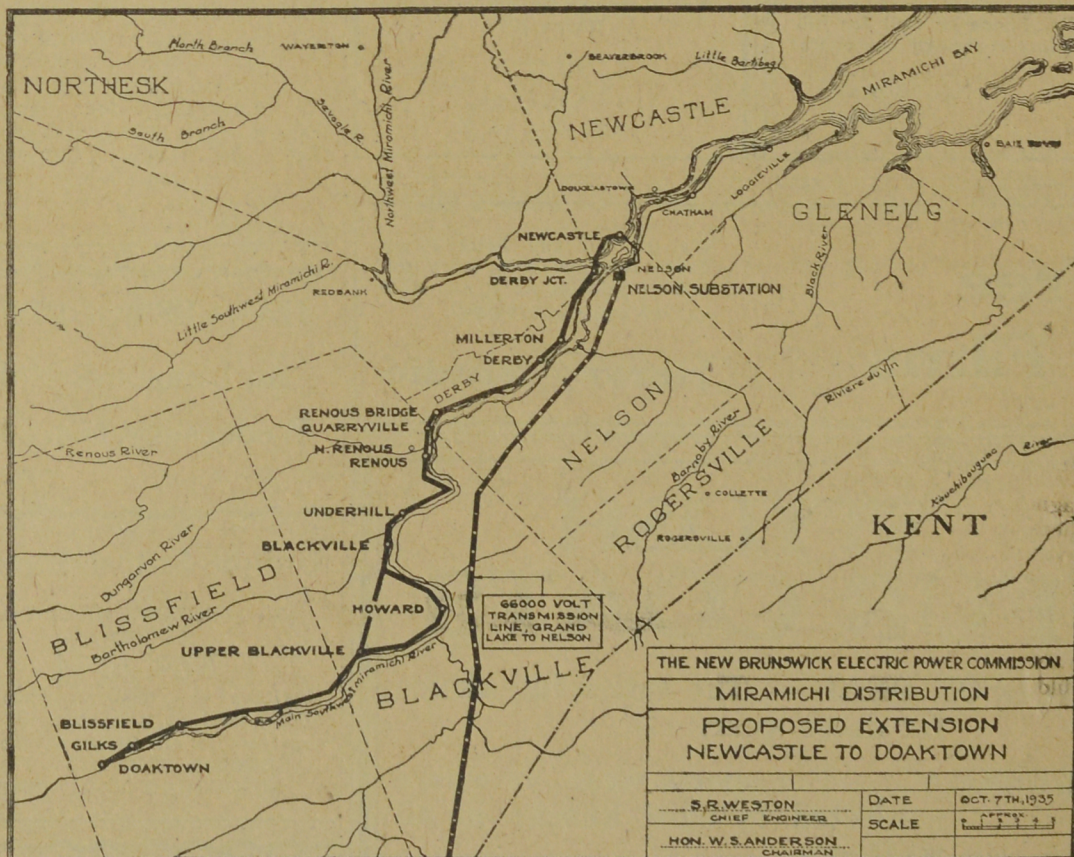

Newcastle-Doaktown Hydro Extension



The above map shows the 66,000 volt transmission line of the New Brunswick Hydro Electric Power
Commission leading from the Commission's Grand Lake Plant at Newcastle Landing, Queens County,
which will carry the necessary power 73 miles to Nelson Substation to serve the proposed extension
from Newcastle to Doaktown.

The proposed extension shown by heavy black lines will make electrical services available to 600
new families representing a population of 2500 people and will route from Newcastle through Derby
Junction, Millerton, Derby, Renous Bridge, Quarryville, North Renous, Renous, Underhill, Blackville,
Upper Blackville, Blissfield and Gilks to and through Doaktown. This is one of the most favorable and
most prosperous sections of the province.

The Government of New Brunswick has recently authorized an expenditure of \$87,000 to complete
the extension, conditioning upon the signing of a minimum number of basic contracts for service.
