

CITY COUNCIL CONCLUDES ITS APRIL BUSINESS, MANY MATTERS

Residents in York street Extension Ask Placing of New Fire Alarm Box—Auditor's Report.

The regular April meeting of the city council was held in the council chamber last evening with His Worship Mayor Clark presiding. Other aldermen present were F. S. Mundie, Dr. H. S. Wright, Moses Mitchell, G. Willard Kitchen, T. Earle Doohan, Warren Maxwell, Ivan McKnight, J. Hedley Forbes and David McCaughey. Minutes of last month's meeting and of the special meeting were read and Mayor Clark read the auditor's report.

Report of tax collections for last month was presented by Ald. Maxwell, which showed that for March, 1934 collections were \$7,001.71, and in March, 1935 collections were \$7,210.26.

E. D. Terry, undertaker, was given permission to erect an electric sign in front of his place of business at 78 Westmorland street, the work to be done under the direction and to the satisfaction of the city engineer.

Ald. Moses Mitchell presented the monthly report of the fire chief Karl A. Walker. The report disclosed that a complaint had been made by thirty one residents beyond the railway track on York street, respecting the inaccessibility of the fire alarm box. They asked that a box be placed farther up the hill. The present one—Box No. 6—is near the C. P. R. tracks and quite a distance away from many of the residents living in that part of the city. The request is that one be placed at the corner of York and Dundonald streets on York Street Extension. The matter was referred to the fire committee with power to act and the report of the fire chief placed on file.

Legislative Library Report Presented; the Committee Re-elected

In the Legislature yesterday afternoon, Mr. Evans submitted a report from the Library Committee, stating that 177 books had been purchased costing \$363.20; that subscribers to the Library had numbered 65, an increase of 41 over the preceding year. The receipts from subscribers was \$73.83. Reference workers using the library numbered 703 and they referred to 2,171 books. The total circulation of books was 2,735 volumes compared to 543 the preceding year. The librarian reported that a number of books had been rebound and necessary furniture procured.

The following were elected as purchasing committee for the present year, viz., Dr. C. C. Jones, Dr. W. C. Kierstead, Dr. H. H. Hagerman, Mrs. J. L. Neville and Miss Mabel Sterling.

The Library, which is under the supervision of a very competent librarian, Miss Margaret Evans, has been thoroughly reorganized during the last couple of years. There is a big increase in the circulation of books. The Library is used each month by an increasingly number of citizens and it is a great service to University, Normal, and Business College students from all over the province who spend hours there preparing for an examination, or for material for an essay. A Normal School student speaking to The Daily Mail today said that he could not measure the amount of assistance he had received from the Legislative Library, and appreciated the service which is cheerfully given to everyone by Miss Evans the librarian. A large percentage of the books are non fiction, there being an increasing demand for Standard works, and there are several good reference magazines.

Amongst the improvements are a rearrangement of the Canadiana section (new equipment will include book trucks and some new book cases and completion of the files department. The committee asked for \$200 for library purposes which hardly seems enough for the work being done.

Protestant Orphans

The executive of the Protestant Orphans' Home are again making an appeal to the Protestant people of this Province to assist in the worthy work now being carried on at Saint John.

The present fiscal year ends on April 30, 1935. On May 1, 1930, the institution did not owe one cent for maintenance. On May 1, 1931, they owed the Bank \$12,000. On May 1, 1932 the overdraft was \$18,000. On May 1, 1933, at was \$27,000. On May 1, 1934, it was \$35,000.00. Today the overdraft is \$40,000.00. Every bill must be paid when the present fiscal year ends on the last day of this month.

For the nine fiscal years ending April 30, 1934, they operated at an average cost per child per day that was 25 cents less than what the Canadian Council on Child and Family Welfare considers to be a fair and proper cost. In the last fiscal year the cost was 32 cents less. During the first ten months of this fiscal year they have been operating at 33 cents less per child per day.

PROGRAM WILL AID BUILDING TRADES

Ottawa Likely To Start
Pubic Works Scheme
Within Short Time.

OTTAWA, April 2—Business in construction lines, building, public work and perhaps the initial stages of housing schemes should be particularly active this year in view of the pending program of public works which has been long under consideration by the Government.

The purpose of going ahead with an additional program was affirmed by Premier Bennett when addressing the Canadian Construction Association in Montreal last January. In the meantime, the suggestions put forward by members of Parliament and others are prolific.

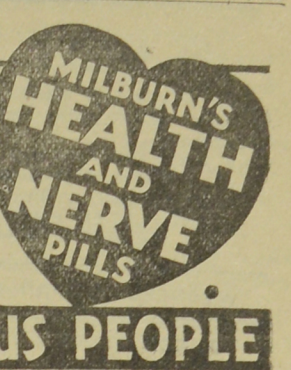

TAKE SPRING TONIC IN PLEASANT WAY

Peppy Salads Will Appeal Even to Masculine Palates.

(By Katharine Baker)

Spring tonic needn't take the joy out of life as old-fashioned sulphur and molasses used to do. Peppy salads in attractive jelly moulds, bring a new interest to menus and a tonic to humans.

A good aspic base, with lemon flavor is the best for fine salads. Any combination of vegetables may be used to give an attractive inexpensive dish.

VEGETABLE SALAD ASPIC

1 package quick-setting lemon jelly powder.
Half teaspoon salt
1 cup warm water
3 to 4 tablespoons vinegar and cold water to make one cup.

Dissolve jelly powder in one cup water, slightly hotter than lukewarm, but not boiling. Add vinegar and cold water and salt. Chill. When slightly thickened, fold in desired vegetables. Turn into mould. Chill until firm. Unmould on crisp lettuce. Garnish with mayonnaise. Serves 6.

Use one to two cups combination of vegetables, such as:
Grated raw carrot, cabbage and green pepper.

Cabbage, celery, pimento, and green pepper.
Cabbage, celery, pimento and pickles.

Cabbage and olives.
Pickled beets, celery and onion, or a small amount of prepared horseradish. (Substitute meat juice for cold water in this combination).

Peas, celery and cabbage.

FRUIT SALAD ASPIC

(Base for fruit or fruit and vegetable salads) is simply made from the following recipe:

1 package quick-setting lemon jelly powder.
1 cup fruit juice and cold water.
1 cup warm water
1 tablespoon vinegar.

Half teaspoon salt (if vegetables are used).

Dissolve jelly powder in warm water, slightly hotter than lukewarm. Add fruit juice, vinegar and salt, if necessary. Chill. When slightly thickened, fold in desired fruits, or fruits and vegetables. Turn into mould. Chill until firm. Unmould on crisp lettuce. Garnish with mayonnaise. Serves 6.

Use one to two cups combination of fruits such as:
Apples, oranges, dates and nuts.
Bananas, white grapes and oranges.

Grapefruit, orange and pineapple. Use one or two cups, combination of fruit and vegetables, such as:
Pineapple and cucumber.
Pineapple, raw carrot and pecan nuts.

Apple, celery and walnut meats.

Dame Laura S. Wood

Sackville, the community in which she spent almost the whole of her long and useful life, mourns the passing of Mrs. Josiah Wood, whose death occurred on Saturday as the result of an injury she sustained from a fall three weeks ago. Dame Laura S. Wood, C.B.E., was the widow of Hon. Josiah Wood, former Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, and was known beyond the confines of the province as a woman of charming qualities, possessed of true benevolence and high Christian attributes, which found expression in her wide range of social welfare activities. She belonged to one of Westmorland's oldest and most distinguished families, and her name for more than half a century has been linked with the advancement of social, educational and Christian endeavor, not only in the university town of Sackville, but throughout her native Province. The Women's Christian Temperance Union, the I.O.D.E., and all welfare organizations in which women play a dominant part had in Mrs. Wood, an active worker, who gave generously of her time, her means and her brilliant talents to their support. Last year, in recognition of her contribution to social welfare work, Mrs. Wood was included among other Canadian women upon whom was bestowed by His Majesty King George the rank of C.B.E., an honor which had been so well earned.—Moncton Times.
