

DOLAN UNABLE TO BE PRESENT AT COMMITTEE

But Points Out That He Can Account For All Expenditures

House Prorogation

Committees Striving To Finish Work Before Tomorrow

D. Leo. Dolan, in a telegram to A. D. Taylor, chairman of the Public Accounts Committee, today stated that he would be unable to attend the meeting of the committee tomorrow owing to engagements made previous to his receipt of a telegram from Chairman Taylor. He also pointed out that he could account for every cent expended on the 1934 Boston Show.

Mr. Dolan, director of the Dominion Tourist Bureau, and former director of the New Brunswick Bureau, was asked to attend the meeting for the purpose of explaining certain expenditures of the New Brunswick Bureau in connection with the 1934 Boston Sportsmen's Show. Mr. Dolan was director of the provincial bureau at that time.

The Public Accounts Committee will hold its last meeting of the session tomorrow morning and will submit their complete report for the session.

It is the hope that tomorrow the House will prorogue and today and tonight committees were working hard to wind up their respective tasks.

MINIMUM WAGE RATE

This week's Royal Gazette gives notice of the establishment of a minimum rate of wages for stream-drivers at \$1.75 per day and board net and no stream driver may be paid at less than the above rate. The new rate was established by the New Brunswick Forest Operations Commission.

According to an announcement in the Royal Gazette this week His Honor the Lieutenant Governor has been pleased to order that Ralph D. Hoben, inspector and auditor under the New Brunswick Forest Operations Commission Act, be appointed commissioner for taking affidavits to be read in the Supreme Court for the purpose of taking statements from persons in connection with his said duties.

Wilkins, Atholville, corresponding secretary and the president, Mrs. Smith. Matters pertaining to the welfare of the Union and of the temperance cause in New Brunswick were discussed and voted upon. A pleasant dinner hour was enjoyed with the president as hostess.

EXTENSION OF STREET

At the regular meeting of the City Council last evening a motion was passed providing for the extension of Heavenbrook street to University Ave. and His Worship Mayor Clark was asked to negotiate with the owners to purchase the necessary land for the purpose. Ald. Kitchen made the motion, which was seconded by Ald. Forbes. Ald. Moses Mitchell mentioned that a member of the University of New Brunswick Senate was opposed to the extension of the street to the University grounds, claiming that there was not enough traffic there to warrant it.

CITY ADOPTS NEW BY-LAW GOVERNING TRAFFIC IN THE CITY, APPROVED BY GOV.-IN-COUNCIL

Police Commission Consolidate Traffic By-Laws—Regulate Traffic in Queen Street In New By - Law—Mayor Says Matter Urgent.

A new by-law which will regulate traffic in Queen street was submitted for the approval of the city council at its April meeting last night. The by-law which his numbered 57 will replace the old one, number 39 and will be submitted for approval to the governor-in-council.

The new traffic regulations incorporate many of the older ones, but there are also three important new ones, one which makes a "stop" street of Carleton where it joins with Queen street coming from the Devon-Fredericton highway bridge; another which forbids the parking of trucks on Queen street, and the third which extends the parking time limit of motor vehicles from thirty minutes to one hour on York, Carleton and Regent streets, between Queen and King streets. While these are the outstanding changes, suggestions were made for slowing up traffic on Brunswick street, making an order for automobiles to park directly in front of the house where the car is stopping, and discouraging the excessive blowing of horns.

By-Law Discussed

The new regulations after being read by His Worship Mayor Clark and discussed by the council, were passed on motion of Ald. C. Hedley Forbes, seconded by Ald. G. Willard Kitchen. By-law No. 39 was repealed.

In bringing the matter before the council, His Worship Mayor Clark declared that the bringing in of the new by-law was "simply a consolidation with the changes referred to, on account of the urgency of the matter, and to avoid possible litigation at any time."

While last night's new by-law, will mean the consolidation of the entire traffic laws into one law, the Police Commission will have full power, as usual, to regulate specific regulation of traffic on the various streets.

Drive Too Fast

During the discussion of the problem of traffic Ald. David McCaughey voiced the opinion that there was too much speeding on Brunswick street, and though it was a "through" street there was no need for anyone driving at the rate of 50 and 60 miles an hour, as he had noticed was being done. Mayor Clark was in accord, also.

DR. BAILEY IMPROVING

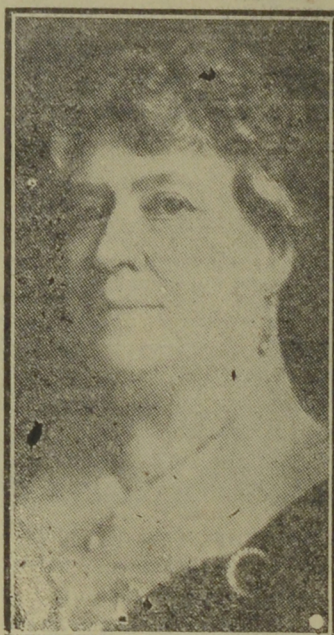

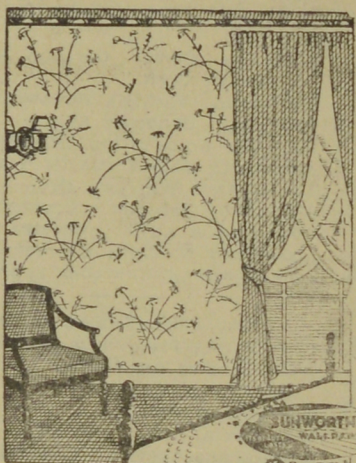
MRS. W. W. WHITE, Saint John, who is Convener of the Committee on Distinguished Visitors and Hospitality.

Excessive hornblowing, and blowing horns at all hours of the morning was another evil to be stopped, the council thought.

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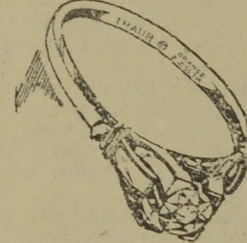
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
