Salmon Feeding

A report from Mr. Russell, which will either settle the century old controversy as to whether salmon feed in fresh water or not, or confuse it all the more, was made to The Daily Mail reporter by the "Fishermen's Host" yesterday, and corroborated by Mr. Edsall. Both men, who have long been strong believers in the theory that salmon do not feed in fresh water, declared that about two weeks ago they saw salmon in front of Mr. Russell's camp rising for little brown flies which were flying in swarms over the water. Mr. Russell, using a dry fly of the "Brown Hackle" variety, caught two or three salmon, opened them, and found several of these brown flies in their stomachs. No one was more surprised than Mr. Russell. "And now," he said, "I am convinced that those salmon were feeding on those flies and that all salmon must feed in fresh water." Mr. Russell, whose article in the New York Herald-Tribune of a week ago received much comment both for and against, says that, although he was a strong believer in the opposite theory before this incident, nothing can convince him now that salmon don't feed in fresh water.

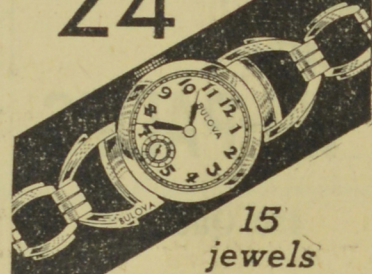
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SOCIAL HAPPENINGS

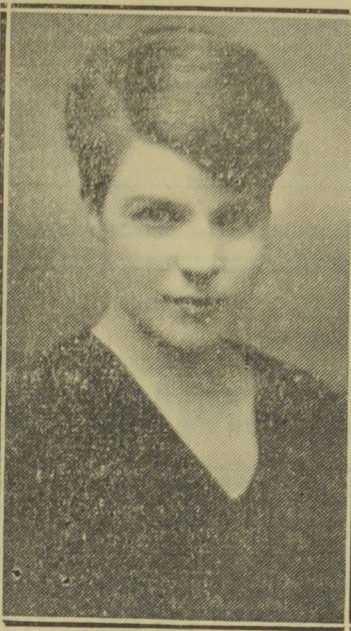
