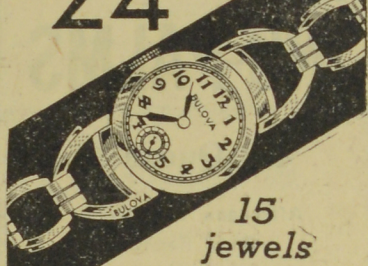
**Reconstruction

Montreal will bid official farewell to Their Excellencies Lord and Lady Bessborough at a ceremony in the City Hall on Friday morning, September 27. Preparations are being made in the mayor's office for the event which will take the form of a public reception. After the reply to the address the public will file past the dais erected in the Hall of Honor to bid farewell to the Governor-General.
