## POTATO SHORTAGE DRIVES PRICE UP

TORONTO, Sept. 18.—With potato quotations soaring to \$1.25 a bag in most Ontario centres, and possibility the price might go higher, Ontario tonight faced a potato shortage which will last till the late crop is marketed, approximately three weeks from now, marketing authorities here said.

### Lack of Rain

J. C. Cassin, member of the Potato Marketing Board, stated dry weather in the Maritimes, Maine and Ontario had resulted in a diminished yield of the new potato crop, which is not sufficient to carry the consumer over till the fall crop is ready.

"The result has been the rise of potato prices in Toronto, and outside markets during the latter part of the week, and particularly on Saturday, from around 65 cents a bag to \$1.25

in some instances," he said. "They might go even higher this week and next, for the supply cannot be materially augmented until the fall crop is ready."

There is no fear of a scarcity of famine proportions, Mr. Cassin indicated. He believes the late crop, maturing now, will be adequate to meet the demand.

"They had plenty of rain in South-western Ontario for the late crop, and when it is marketed, the price will settle down to normal again," he commented.

Dry weather in Wellington, Dufferin and Ontario Counties in this province resulted in small yields. Farmers, as a result, have held what crop they had for a rise in the prices, which came last week, but even the crop available for the market at prices above \$1.00 would not be sufficient to meet the total consumer's demand, he indicated. Possibility of importing potatoes from the East have been eliminated by the crop failure there, Mr. Cassin said.

## TED LYONS REMINISCES ON DIFFICULT ART OF PITCHING

Relates How He Hurt Arm and by Coaxing It Back Into Shape Thereby Becomes Better Pitcher Than He Ever Was

Ted Lyons had opened his bag and taken out a lot of letters he should have answered long ago, and was just going to answer them when you knocked on the door of his room high in the New Yorker. So he put the letters back in his bag and got into a more comfortable chair and began to punch the bag about one thing and another. One of the things that he said was that it wasn't a night game in which he injured his arm in pitching against the Giants in the spring of 1931, although the notion that it was has been widespread.

"One of the baseball writers in Chicago still insists it was a night game," he said. Even I can't change his mind about that. But it was my arm, so I guess that's one argument I win.

It was my fault that I hurt it, too. I wasn't quite ready to pitch when Donny Bush, who was managing the Sox then, asked me if I could pitch a couple of innings against the Giants in Houston, because he figured there might be a few folks there who remembered when I pitched at Baylor and might like to see me pitch again. Donny was a swell manager, and if I refused to pitch because I thought I wasn't ready it would have been all right with him. That's what I was going to do at first, but when we got down there I told him I would go a couple of innings.

"That's where I made my mistake. A pitcher who isn't ready never should pitch at any time, especially in the spring against a good ball club like the Giants. You don't mean to bear down when you go in there, but if you haven't got plenty on the ball they will knock your ears off. Naturally, when they start hitting you, you don't like it, and you do bear down, and sometimes you wind up hurting yourself like I did.

"Johnny Vergez was at bat with the bases filled, and I had him three and two, so I thought I would cross him by throwing him a book. I did, and he took it for a third strike, but as I let the ball go, something right up here in my shoulder snapped. It didn't hurt. Click! Just like that. But my arm dropped to my side.

"I told Donnie when I got to the dugout that my arm was gone, but he asked me to try and pitch another inning, just to see if I could pitch the kink out of it, but it was like trying to throw a sixteen-pound shot up to the plate. So I quit. That night I drove up to my home in Vinton, La., which is just over the line from Texas, and I knew then that the arm was gone, because I could hardly pull the wheel around with it.

Where Caution Fosters Learning  
"It took me a long time to get over that injury, as you know. But I learned one thing: They're right when they say you don't get to know how to pitch until you've had a sore arm. Of course, I'd rather have escaped having the sore arm, but it does teach you a lot of things you might have missed otherwise.

"There is no question about it making you cautious. A fellow like Schoolboy Rowe or Dizzy Dean doesn't have to stop to think before he pitches. He just rears back and throws. He can even tell you where he's going to pitch and still you can't hit it.  
"But if you've hurt your arm you can't do that. You're afraid that if you just pull back and hurl the ball up there your arm will go with it. So you try to pitch in such a way that you put the least possible strain on your arm, and in order to do that you've got to study the hitters more carefully than you did before, and you've got to have better control than you ever had before. So by the time you get the lameness out of your arm the chances are you are a better pitcher than you were before you hurt it.

"How long does it take to make a big league pitcher out of a busher? Well, that depends. Two or three years in most cases, I should say. But, looking back, it seems to me that I made it in about a year and a half. That was because I was fortunate in having more help than most young pitchers—almost any young pitcher, for that matter—ever got. When I came up with the Sox in 1923 Ray Schalk was catching and Eddie Collins would be at my elbow. They'd say 'high and inside,' or 'keep it low on this fellow,' or whatever was the right way to pitch. All I had to do was get the ball where they wanted it and, fortunately, my control was pretty good. One thing they never told me was to throw any slow stuff, which was smart, because when a young pitcher throws a slow ball he is likely to

lay it in where it can be hit. It wasn't until the next season I learned from experience how to pull the string on the fast ball now and then.

### One Little Mistake and—Blooie!

"The best hitters I ever pitched to? Well, Babe Ruth was one. He was the most dangerous, I'd say. Make a mistake on most hitters and they nick you for a hit, but when you make a mistake with Babe, like as not he'd nick you for the ball game. I always thought Collins was about as smart a hitter as I ever saw—Collins and Ty Cobb, because, of course, you can't leave Cobb out of it when you are talking about smart hitters, although usually I was lucky enough to get away with it when I pitched to Cobb. I didn't get away with much pitching to Collins, though. He had the pitchers down as pat as we try to get the hitters, and he always knew what any pitcher would pitch to him in any given situation. I used to get a great kick out of seeing him hit when he was with us. Afterwards, when he went back to the Athletics and I had to pitch against him, I discovered just how smart he was.

"I remember one time, when I had him three and two, and I knew he was looking for a fast ball, I thought I would lay him across by throwing him a cross ball. So I did, and he caught it on the end of his bat and slapped a single to left. Going down to first base he laughed and said:  
"Try a curve ball on me with three and two, hey?"

"He never forgot it, either. Every time I see him he asks me how my curve ball is.

"I've pitched to a lot of other good hitters—Gehrig, for instance. But the fellow I cared least about pitching to was Al Simmons, when he was with the Athletics. There was—and, for that matter, still is—a great hitter, even if he is having some trouble this year. He gives himself plenty of room around the plate, and no matter where you pitch to him he's in a position to hit it. And like all good hitters, he'll just wear you down if you try to make him hit at a bad ball.

### He's a Sunday Pitcher Now

"I've had more enjoyment out of pitching this year than I have had in a long while. That's because my arm is in such good shape again, and the conditions under which I've worked have been so pleasant. Early in the season, with all our young pitchers going so well—and, by the way, Whitehead is the best young pitcher I ever saw—it happened that I didn't work more than once a week. Dykes asked me if I minded.

"I should say not," I told him. "It gives me just the rest I need and when I get in there I feel like pitching."

"So, the way it's been, mostly, I've worked every Sunday. Lately I've got off the schedule a bit and I've been in a few weekday games, but generally speaking, when I wake up in the morning and look out the window and see people going to church I know it's my turn to pitch."

## KIWANIS TOOK SECOND DEFEAT IN PLAYDOWNS

Beaten by Yarmouth Gateways 6 to 2 Yesterday — Teams at St. Stephen Tomorrow.

YARMOUTH, N. S., Sept. 19.—A fighting band of St. Stephen-Milltown Kiwanis will return to St. Stephen tonight, two games down in the Maritime baseball finals, having dropped the second of the series here to Yarmouth Gateways yesterday, 6 to 2.

It was not only until they lost second encounter in successive days that New Brunswick champions were aroused, Cecil (Lefty) Brownell, bespectacled southpaw heaver and ace of the pitching corps, was given the assignment for Friday's game at the border while his mates gave him every assurance that they would come through on the home diamond with their first win of the series.
