

A MIRACULOUS ESCAPE FROM SERIOUS HURT

12-Year-Old Daughter
of Mr. and Mrs. J.R.M.
MacKenzie Injured

Occurred at Saint John

Child Was Being Taken
to Netherwood School
by Her Mother

Leila MacKenzie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. M. MacKenzie, of Waterloo Row, received nasty injuries, when she was thrown from the rear seat of her mother's car as Wilfred Waddelow, the driver, swerved to the left from the rear of a city bound street car on Douglas Avenue at Saint John last evening. The car struck an oncoming tram car bound for West Saint John with the result that the street car crushed the rear of the automobile, and ripped the door open. The Fredericton girl was hurled to the pavement but was not seriously injured, although she escaped death by a miracle.

Others Unhurt

The young girl was injured about the face, her mouth, being cut, and also about the knees, which were bruised painfully from the fall. The little girl was being taken to Netherwood School by her mother at the time of the accident. She was rushed to the home of R. H. Peterson nearby where medical attention was given her. The young girl lost several teeth as a result of her fall from the car.

Neither Mrs. MacKenzie nor the driver were injured in the accident although all three escaped serious injuries by a miracle. The automobile was badly damaged. Police investigated the accident.

Mr. MacKenzie was in Saint John at the time. It is understood that the young girl's injuries were not serious enough to warrant bringing her back to her home here and she will commence her studies after medical attention.

The York-Sunbury Historical Society resumed its regular monthly meetings last evening in the Museum, upstairs in the post-office building. Major F. A. Good was in the chair and a large gathering enjoyed a very fine paper prepared by Fred H. Phillips, dealing with activities of steamboats on the Saint John River in the past and present. The paper gave evidence of much research and interest by Mr. Phillips, who writes in a very entertaining way with a good sprinkling of wit and humor. It is hoped that another paper by the same gentleman may soon be heard by members and friends of the society.

These meetings are open to all and are both pleasant and profitable. Students in the city would find much of interest and benefit not only by visiting the museum in the afternoons but also by attending the monthly meetings.

Arrange Programme

C. A. Taylor, curator, described many of the recent accessions, and routine business was discussed, including details in connection with the unveiling next Thursday of the monument in honor of New Brunswick men who fought in the war of 1812. His Majesty's 104th Regiment having been recruited and stationed for some years in this province, Fredericton being headquarters of the unit.

Special reference was made in Mr. Phillips' paper and in the discussion which followed, of Benjamin Tibbitts, a Queens County man of great inventive genius, who gave the compound marine engine to the world here in Fredericton in the old days. It is hoped that this native New Brunswicker's achievements may be recognized before long by the Historic Sites and Monument Board of Canada.

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POTATO PRICE IN PROVINCE STIMULATED

At Present Potatoes Selling for \$1 per Barrel
in N. B.

No Movement Here

With Crop Less, Price
Is Expected to
Continue High

While there has been only slight loading of potatoes in New Brunswick so far this season, the price at the present time is \$1 per barrel, with prospects of the provincial variety selling even higher. This is the highest price to be obtained for the New Brunswick potato in several years. Last year, with the provincial market overstocked, the price was practically negative.

The New Brunswick crop this year will be almost forty per cent less than it was last year, and the possibility is that it will all be consumed within the province on this account, also that with demand greater the price will show a corresponding rise.

Shipments Less

Shipments of the provincial crop to Ontario and other places will be less this year than last. It is expected. This in spite of the fact that there has been a serious shortage of potatoes in Ontario this year. The natural expectation is that New Brunswick would sell to Ontario in view of the shortage, with the prospect of securing a good price.

So far in this province there is little of the new crop available. Digging has hardly more than commenced in most parts of New Brunswick. So far the farmers have not appeared anxious to haul or sell, seemingly waiting for

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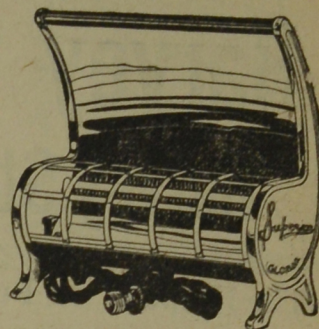
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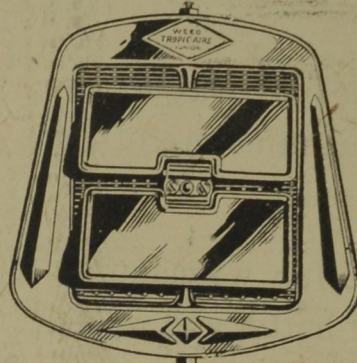
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
