

NO POSTERS ON WINDSHIELDS IS N. B. RULING

Motor Vehicle Branch Lays Emphasis on Poster Display Veto

Applications Refused

To Enforce Regulations in Interest of Public Safety is Aim

The Motor Vehicle Branch of the Department of Public Works is at present laying particular emphasis on that section of the Motor Vehicle Act which prohibits the displaying of posters or other non-transparent signs on the windshield or other windows of a motor vehicle.

This vigilance on the part of the Motor Vehicle Branch has been prompted to ensure the greater safety of the motoring public. Only recently applications from two provincial organizations asking permission for members to exhibit posters on car windshields and windows have been refused by the Branch. The instructions given to executives of the Branch by Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works, are to rigidly enforce the regulation.

Greater Safety

This action is provided for in Section 47, Sub-section 2, of the Motor Vehicle Act of the Province of New Brunswick. It reads:

No person shall operate on a highway a motor vehicle with any sign, poster or other non-transparent material upon the windshield, side wings, side or rear windows of such motor vehicle other than a certificate or other paper approved by or required to be displayed by the Department.

The Pyrotechnic Display Here Most Pretentious in Many Years

Victoria Day was passed quietly in the capital with no unusual ceremonies, the display of pyrotechnics being the most pretentious part of the day's activities, and that feature commenced on the previous night. Those residents who were possessed of more of the wanderlust jumped into their cars and made for the many fishing streams in this part of the province, bent on securing the elusive trout. Others had picnics planned for the day.

The weather yesterday was generally fair, though the temperature remained as cold as it had been for the past several weeks. In the city and outskirts a heavy fall of hail occurred in the afternoon, lasting for probably half an hour. A baseball game at Devon and special motion picture shows attracted many of the citizens.

Lots of Firecrackers

A feature of this year's celebrations of Queen Victoria's birthday was the huge display of fireworks. In recent years pyrotechnics, partly because of strict surveillance by the police and partly because of a limited sale of firecrackers, had been nearly abandoned in the celebration. This year fireworks came back with a bang. Children and adults indulged this harmless whim to the fullest on Thursday night and yesterday. Local stores carried more stock of the firecrackers than usual and the holiday was given a great impetus by the display. Police kept constant watch and no harm resulted from the fun.

From those who spent the day fishing there was many a fish story told today around the streets. And apart from the expected fantasy of some of the yarns, there were nevertheless some good catches made.

Many residents took the occasion to motor to various points of the province. Report today was that most of the highways are rounding into good shape. Not a few local people went to Houlton and other parts of Maine for the holiday.

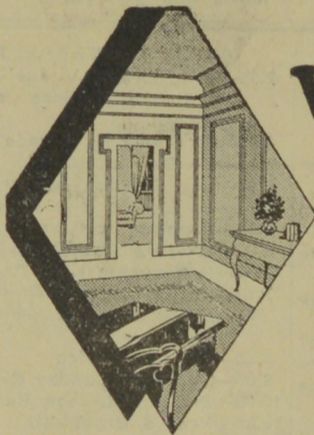

G. McKenzie of Halifax, W. K. Campbell, of Ottawa, secretary of Sir Richard; and Col. G. A. Gamblin, M.C., pensions advocate.

The sittings, which are being held at the York county court house, are open to the public and several interesting cases are likely to ensue. From this city the quorum will hold court at Newcastle and other places in the Maritimes.

Of the eight cases investigated this morning, one is from Hamilton, Ontario, and another originates in the city of Saint John. It is understood that there are a few Fredericton applications also.

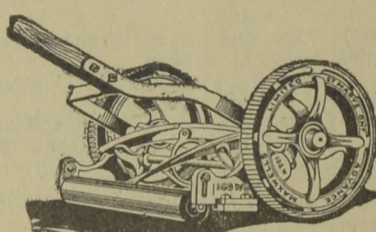

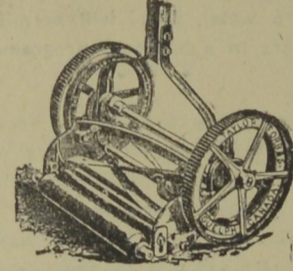
