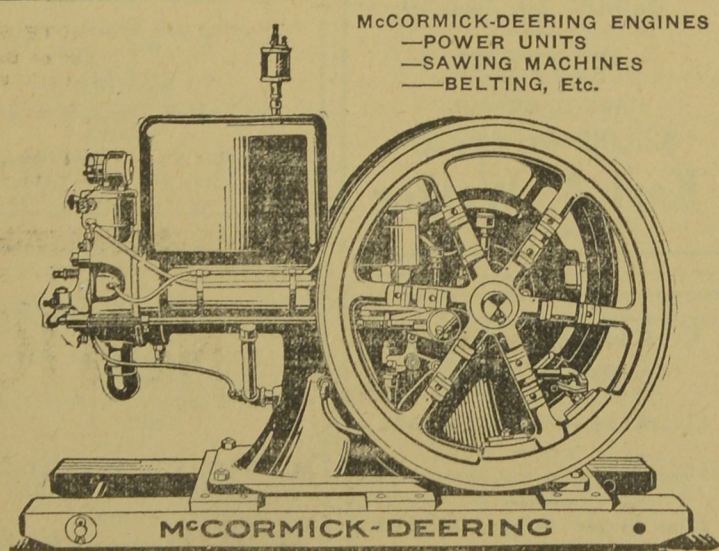

N.B. WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION BOARD REPORT

The sixteenth annual report of the New Brunswick Workmen's Compensation Board was tabled in the Legislature yesterday by Hon. A. J. Leger K. C., Provincial Secretary-Treasurer, which showed an actual credit balance of \$86,241 for the year 1933, compared with an estimated credit balance of \$142,579 for that year. A deficit of \$51,634 is estimated for the year 1934.

In brief the report shows the compensation cost of accidents in the province in 1933 amounted to \$527,923, which, except for the years 1926, 1931 and 1932, was the lowest since 1922. In 1922 the cost was considerably lower at \$359,593. Similarly the number of accidents in 1933 throughout the various classes was larger than in either 1931 or 1932. The numbers for 1933 were as follows: Total, 26; permanent total, 3; permanent partial, 348; temporary total, 3,606; minor and medical aid only, 2,700, making a total of 6,683.

The summary of the Board for the calendar year 1934 stated that it was found necessary to write off, as bad debts, the sum of \$2,466, mainly on account of the debtors having left the province or having made assignments.

The total income for the year 1934 is estimated at \$556,570 and the expenditure at \$676,446, leaving an estimated deficit of \$119,875. Deducting from this the surplus of \$68,241 carried forward from 1933, there is left an estimated deficit of \$51,634.

In an appended report, William Golding, factory inspector, says:

"We regret to have to report a fatal accident due to exposed machinery during 1934. I am strongly opposed to the use of wooden pulleys in portable mills. They are exposed to climatic conditions which cause rapid deterioration and as a result they break very easily. In all cases where wooden pulleys are being used I have recommended that they be well guarded.

"The number of licenses issued for stationary engineers was considerably increased in 1934, likewise the number of new applicants. We issued 766 renewal licenses and 83 new applicants.

"It is still felt by the board of examiners that the engineer's licenses should be graded. The license we use today entitles the holder to operate any boiler in the Province of New Brunswick and as our industries vary from very small butter and cheese plants in the Dominion and the boilers vary from one horsepower to 1,000 h.p., it is felt that the licenses should be graded accordingly."

HAUPTMANN DEFENCE FUND IS STOPPED

NEW YORK, March 8.—Solicitations for the appeal fund of Bruno Richard Hauptmann under sentence to die for the murder of the Lindbergh baby, were ordered stopped today.

Acting Commissioner of Public Welfare Stanley H. Howe said he had ordered Mrs. Anna Hauptmann, wife of the condemned man and her appeal fund campaign manager David Weber, to call all public appeals for funds any fund boxes that might have been set up in public places.

"Such activities," he said, "are a clear violation of the city code."

Twenty five thousand dollars has already been collected.

Gold Tax Revenue Totals \$5,883,711

OTTAWA March 8.—Thirteen gold mining companies in Canada paid gold tax amounting to \$5,883,711 up to Jan. 31, 1935, Finance Minister E. N. Rhodes told the House of Commons yesterday. These mines were Smelters, Dome, Hollinger, International Nickel, Lake Shore McIntyre Noranda Pioneer Premier, Siscoe, Sylvanite, Teck Hughes and Wright Hargreaves.

SAME COFFIN USED FOR ALL CONVICTS

Every Time One Dies on
Devil's Island He Is
Put In It.

Only one coffin exists on dismal Devil's Island, the lonely French penal colony. When a convict dies his body is placed in a heavy wooden box used over and over again for the same purpose, according to Captain Eugene Coates, Bluenose skipper of the freighter Moyra. The corpse is taken a short distance from shore and thrown overboard without ceremony, said Captain Coates after returning from a voyage to the West Indies and South America.

Moncton Bill Not Recommended in House

A bill to authorize the city and county of Saint John to make a further issue of debentures for the Saint John General Hospital not exceeding the sum of \$7,000.00 to enable the board of commissioners of the Hospital to purchase and install a new X-ray machine was recommended.

A bill to amend the act relating to the sale of real estate for default taxes in the parishes of the city and county of Saint John was recommended with considerable discussion.

A bill to authorize the City and County of Saint John to issue debentures amounting to \$88,100 for direct relief and other purposes was recommended.

The committee then went into private session.

Private Session

The committee in private session considered three bills concerning the town of Marysville, the town of St. George, and an agreement between the city of Moncton and the Swift Canadian Company.

An Act authorizing the town of Marysville to issue debentures and to amend chapter 97 22 George V., was recommended and reported as amended.

An Act relating to the town of St. George in the county of Charlotte reported as amended with a plebiscite authorized.

An Act to confirm an agreement between the city of Moncton and Swift Canadian Company, Limited was not recommended.

The Municipalities Committee considered a bill to amend the Act incorporating the Town of Saint Stephen. Hon. Mr. Cockburn explained that the assessors of the town were now elected and the bill asked authority to have them appointed by the Council. He added that the electors had approved of the principle at the last civic election. The Committee agreed to report the bill.

A bill to confirm and ratify the action of the assessors and receiver of taxes of the City of Saint John in not selling real estate, for taxes in 1934, was next considered and agreed to.

A bill to authorize the City and County of Saint John to make a further issue of debentures in aid of the Saint John General Hospital for the purpose of installing a new X-ray machine was explained by County Secretary W. A. Ross and agreed to.

The Committee next took up consideration of a bill relating to real estate in default of taxes in the parishes of Saint John County. County Secretary Ross submitted some new sections which were approved by the Committee and incorporated in the bill. He explained that some changes had been with regard to the publication of notices for the sale of property in default of taxes. The bill was agreed to, as also was another bill from Saint John County authorizing an issue of debentures for direct relief.

The Committee then went into private session to consider a bill relating to the Swift Canadian Company of Moncton.

LIQUOR OFFENCE

Ben Hanson, of Keswick, was fined \$100 or three months in jail, when convicted today before Police Magistrate Walter Limerick of an offence under the Intoxicating Liquor Act of the province. Hanson was sentenced to three months on a vagrancy charge also.

boat manned by two convicts constantly under the eyes of two heavily armed guards in the stern. Striped stevedores, thin, pallid and hard-eyed, handled the cargo picked up at Cayenne, said Captain Coates.

The climate there is extremely detrimental to a white person's health. Poisonous snakes infest Cayenne river district to such an extent that the Moyra's ropes had to be tarred to prevent the reptiles from crawling aboard. A doctor never stays on the island more than two years at a time and guards are relieved after periods of five to ten years.

Captain Coates described the present prison doctor as a "thoroughly fed up young fellow" who said sixteen deaths had occurred on the island in a year. Four were cases of murder resulting from fights between the convicts. Just before the Moyra arrived, said Captain Coates, the doctor did an emergency operation on a guard who had suffered a severe head gash inflicted by a hammer in the hands of a convict.

Three islands comprise the colony, one containing some 200 particularly violent convicts who are allowed little or no freedom, said the captain.

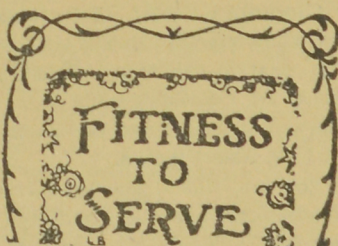
