Old Times Recalled

The following paper by Rev. Dr. Wightman was read before the York and Sunbury Historical Society on Wednesday. At the request of a number of our readers who are interested we are publishing the paper in installments.

OUR FORGOTTEN BURIAL PLACES AND THEIR HISTORIC VALUE

(Continued from yesterday)

N. 8.—In same enclosure on marble slab, evidently at first marking a grave outside the enclosure:

"In memory of Deborah White, a native of Middleton, County of Monmouth, New Jersey, died June 1st, 1850 (born 1733)

N. 9.—Also in the same enclosure. Tall finely cut and well preserved freestone monument, about 10 feet high. The above marble slab now leans against back of this monument which carries an inscription to the same person:

"In memory of Deborah, wife of William White, a native of Middleton, Monmouth Co., New Jersey, died 1st June, 1849, aged 97 years"

(Note: On the first inscription date of death is 1850, one year earlier).

"William White, a native of Middleton, Monmouth Co., New Jersey, U. S. Died 6th Dec., 1867 in the 99th year of his age."

"Reader as you pass by,
On this tombstone cast an eye;
As you are now so once was I;
As I am now so you must be;
Prepare for death and follow me."

In addition to the above there are a number of graves marked by small slabs of native sandstone. Some old pollings are in evidence, and it would appear that some remains had been disinterred and buried elsewhere.

There is in the open meadow near by what may be the outline of the foundation of a building. Perhaps in the early days a small church stood on this spot.

This is but one of hundreds of similarly neglected burial places in New Brunswick. It is a thousand pities that these conditions exist in so many places within our province. The question is, what can be done to help this situation? It would be a splendid piece of service if some organization or combination of organizations could or would interest themselves in these old and forgotten cemeteries. In many instances probably sufficient community interest could be aroused to make repairs. A few places might need more practical assistance. Public and community interest is the greatest need.

The Telegraph-Journal recently told of what Mr. George D. Robertson, formerly of Norton, Kings County, but now of California, had done to beautify the burial ground at the old River Meeting House above Norton, where his relatives were laid to rest. Not only was he instrumental in making the cemetery a place of beauty, but he erected a memorial chapel on the site of the old Meeting House of his childhood.

PROBE ON MAY 2

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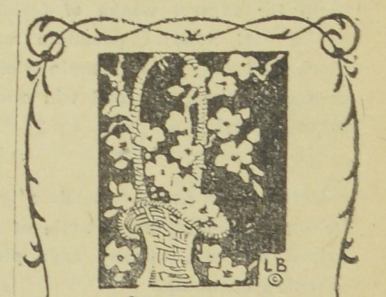
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
