COMMUNITY CO-OPERATION

"Community Interests—Community Fun,
The good of the whole, rather than of one".

This is our slogan—we're holding it high;
May it thrive and grow! May it never die!

We're trying to learn what can be done
To lighten the burdens of everyone.

Currieburg, N. B., is an isolated community thirty miles from Fredericton, seven miles from Stanley and four miles from the nearest church and community hall, so the problem of recreating and social activities is a real one. To improve the situation the women—last November—organized an Institute. This was followed later by the organization of a Men's Study Club, which has resulted in a 100 per cent community co-operation. Once each month the ladies meet on an appointed afternoon and at the close of a busy afternoon, enjoy a community supper. In the evening the men hold their meeting while the young people are being entertained by the women, after which refreshments are served. The men have secured the co-operation of the Department of Agriculture. A two-days short course was provided recently with Mr. E. M. Taylor, Field Husbandman, and Mr. Stanley Wood, Live Stock Superintendent, giving the instruction and encouraging discussion. The meetings have been addressed by several gentlemen; Mr. Leslie Wood, Mr. Maynard Harrison, Mr. A. E. Raymond, Mr. T. A. Best, Mr. James Thorburn and Mr. J. H. King, Federal Live Stock Promoter, while Mr. Thos. Hetherington sent a written address. In the course of Mr. King's address he congratulated the men for their initiative in organizing this club—the first of its kind in New Brunswick.
