## Howard Barlow's "Symphonic Hour" In Varied Program

The "Symphonic Hour", featuring Howard Barlow directing the Columbia Symphony Orchestra, will broadcast a concert of outstanding works by famous composers over the nationwide WABC-CBS chain on Sunday, June 9, from 3:00 to 4:00 P. M., A. S. T. Barlow will open his program with the charming overture, "The Marriage Secret" by Cimarosa. This will be followed by Mozart's G minor Symphony and the second half of the "Symphonic Hour" will be devoted to two Wagner compositions, the "Siegfried Idyll" and the Prelude to "Die Meistersinger".

Gene Baker, popular young baritone now featured with Howard Barlow and his Symphony Orchestra, will be heard in a program of favorite orchestral and vocal numbers to be broadcast over the coast-to-coast WABC-Columbia network tonight from 9:30 to 10:00 P. ## Battle of Baritones In "National Amateur Night Programme"

What promises to be another battle of baritone is scheduled during the "National Amateur Night" broadcast on the WABC-Columbia network, Sunday, June 9, from 6:00 to 6:30 P. M., A. S. T. In this special vocal fray, two widely separated sections of the United States—the great southwest and the Pacific northwest—will be represented by Irvin Henricks of San Antonio, Texas and Wally Johl, Jr., of Wenatchee, Washington. Both baritones are journeying to New York especially for the broadcast.

Johl enters the lists as winner of an amateur contest conducted by the northwest, and Henricks as champion of a series of broadcasts in the southwest, conducted by Alice Joy, the popular songstress.

Johl not only hails from Bing Crosby's home state, but will sing one of two songs which are part of Bing's repertoire: "Smoke Gets in Your Eyes" or "Two Cigarettes in the Dark". Henricks will sing either "Because" or "Song of Songs".

Supplementing the baritone battle, five other amateur performers will take part in the program. George Chah Baron, a Persian, will play an ancient native instrument known as a tarr and resembling a guitar. The

moods will be offered by Baker who will open his program with Squire's vivacious "Three for Jack". Later the young baritone will be heard in Sigmond Romberg's melody, "Wanting You" from the operetta, "New Moon".

## MICROPHONICS

Joe Cook, star of "Circus Night," heard over the NBC network every Friday evening, was hesitant about accepting a radio contract for five years. This, notwithstanding the fact that he had been in show business since the age of 12.

If Johnny Hauser, featured vocalist on NBC's "Hit Parade" should ever tire of radio, he could always make a living as a trader. Johnny traded an old auto for a set of drums several years ago and travelled around the South with various orchestras. When a band needed a trumpet player instead of a drummer, he swapped his traps for a bugle; when saxophone players were more in demand, Johnny did some more exchanging. At the end of six months, his inventory consisted of one old car and a whistle.

Melody Eight, a negro octet of New York City, will sing "Trees". Enzio Comanda, violinist, of Danbury, Connecticut, will play "The Moonlight Madonna", and Joan Pennman, New York blues singer, will be another soloist.

Master of ceremonies Ray Perkins will act as arbitrator in the contest and Arnold Johnson's Orchestra will accompany the performers. Johnson himself will not be allowed to take a hand in judging the show because of prejudice. For the wife of "Wen" Talbert, arranger and accompanist of the negro "Melody Eight", used to do some sewing for Mrs. Johnson.

Jack Benny, whose broadcasts are now originating from Hollywood, had to buy ten new suits for his role in his new picture. He will be seen as a newspaper columnist.

Bridge is bridge in any language—but it's going to be the subject of a series of broadcasts in Spanish. The Four Aces, international champions, will make a series of electrical transcriptions of the type of programs they have been presenting over CBS, for release in South America. Jose Gonzales will serve as announcer for the Spanish version.

Her recent rendition of the comedy ballad, "How Now, Brown Cow," which tells of the troubles of a cockney woman in learning how to speak the King's English, has had a strange reaction for Beatrice Lillie. A number of elocution students are seeking interviews with her and a New York school of speech has invited her to be a guest lecturer.

Jesse Block and Eve Sully, popular radio comics of the CBS "Big Show" who are scheduled to make a featured length film in Hollywood late next month, will make a series of theatrical appearances in principal cities enroute to the coast. Arrangements have been made whereby the team will continue their broadcasts from these various towns.

## Ethel Merman To Dramatize Her Famous "I Got Rhythm"

Ethel Merman, whose inimitable rendition of George Gershwin's "I Got Rhythm" skyrocketed her to theatrical fame, will present a special dramatized version of the well known number during the next edition of her "Rhythm at 8" series over WABC and the coast-to-coast Columbia network. "I Got Rhythm" will be the highlight of her Sunday, June 9th program, from 8:00 to 8:30 P. M., A. S. T.

Comparatively unknown to Broadway musical comedy and revue audiences, Miss Merman won immediate recognition and wide acclaim four years ago with her unusual delivery of the Gershwin number in "Girl Crazy". Since then she has been known to stage, screen and radio audiences as the "I Got Rhythm Girl" and has established a record of introducing more national song hits than any other young singing star in a similar space of time.

Miss Merman will be assisted in her vocal and dramatic interpretation of the number by Ned Wever, a distinguished supporting cast of CBS players, and the musical accompaniment of Al Goodman and his orchestra. Her additional vocal offerings will include "I've Got a Right to Sing the Blues", "Smile, Darn Ya, Smile", "When You're Smiling" and "Wipe That Frown Off Your Face". Another regular feature of the "Rhythm at 8" broadcasts is Ted Husing, CBS sports commentator.

## International Labor Delegates Speak from Geneva On CBS

A radio interview with two principals of the International Labor Conference will be broadcast by the Columbia-WABC network from Geneva, Switzerland, on Sunday, June 9, from 12:45 to 1:00 P. M., A. S. T. The spokesmen will represent both employers and workers.

Samuel A. Lewisohn, advisor to the employers' delegates, and Daniel W. Tracy, Labor delegate and president of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, will be interviewed by Spencer Miller, head of the Workers' Educational Bureau of America. Included in the broadcast will be a report on activities of the conference, which aims to improve the relationship of Labor and world conditions. The broadcast was arranged by Governor John G. Winant of New Hampshire, assistant director of the International Labor Board, in co-operation with Spencer and Columbia's European representative, Cesar Saerchinger.

On Sunday, June 23, at the same hour (12:45 to 1:00 P. M., A. S. T.) a second broadcast from Geneva will sum up the achievements and results of the conference as it draws to a close.


