### SPECTACULAR DISPLAY IN SKY LAST NIGHT

Northern Lights Carved Many a Pattern in the Clear Heavens

Many Saw Phenomenon

Luminous Meteoric Display Likely Reflector Of Polar Area

Citizens were given a glimpse of nature in the raw last evening as they watched the myriad dancing of the Northern lights in the sky. The Aurora Borealis, as it is scientifically known, was the most spectacular to be seen in months and pattern after pattern of fantastic figures were carved on the sky. It is popularly believed that the "Northern lights" are caused by the reflection of the sun on Polar ice.

This luminous meteoric phenomenon is visible only at night and is supposed to be of electrical origin. This species of light usually appears in streams, ascending toward the Zenith from a dusky line or bank, a few degrees above the northern horizon; when reaching south beyond the Zenith it forms what is called the corona, about a spot in the heavens toward which the dipping needle points. Occasionally the Aurora appears as an arch of light across the heavens from east to west.

Sometimes it assumes a wavy appearance and the streams of light are then called "merry dancers." They assume a variety of colors, from a pale red and yellow to a deep red or blood color.

Many of the citizens homeward-bound last night stopped to gaze at the spectacular show in the skies.

### PICKED UP HERE TO BE RETURNED TO ONTARIO JAIL

Walter H. White, Marysville, Escaped From Guelph, July 9, '34.

Arrested at Home

R.C.M.P. Had Been On Watch Was Serving Theft Sentence

Walter H. White, Marysville youth, who escaped from a Guelph, Ontario jail on July 9, 1934, was picked up by the New Brunswick R.C.M.P. here yesterday, who are holding the youth, pending action by the Ontario authorities. Ontario authorities are expected to send an escort here within a few days to take White back to Guelph.

Inspector John Bird of R.C.M.P. police headquarters here said today that the police had been on the lookout for young White since last year. His arrest was made yesterday afternoon, police taking him at his home. It is reported that he had been in Marysville for several weeks.

White is the son of Mrs. L. White who lives on Allen street in Marysville. The Marysville man had been serving a sentence for theft in the Guelph, Ontario, jail.
