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SERIOUS INJURY

WOODSTOCK, N. B., July 26 — Three United States tourists had a narrow escape from serious injury yesterday afternoon when their car upset while they were driving from Woodstock to Houlton. The car was driven by Mrs. Ethel Hamilton, Urbana, Illinois, and had just descended the hill near the international boundary. When it was almost directly in front of the Canadian customs office, one of the wheels locked and the car swerved, climbed an embankment, dropped back into the road and turned over. Its occupants escaped with a severe shaking-up. They were taken to the home of Fred Barslow, United States customs inspector and later in the afternoon they recovered sufficiently to proceed to Houlton. The car was considerably damaged.

There may also be a reorganization in the department of the Attorney General of which department R. P. Hartley, K.C., is now deputy attorney general. It is stated about town that a well known barrister, who was a candidate in a former provincial election, was an applicant for the position with good chances of success. It was expected that this appointment would have gone through this morning but according to the statement made by Hon. Mr. Dysart following the close of the government meeting such was not the case.

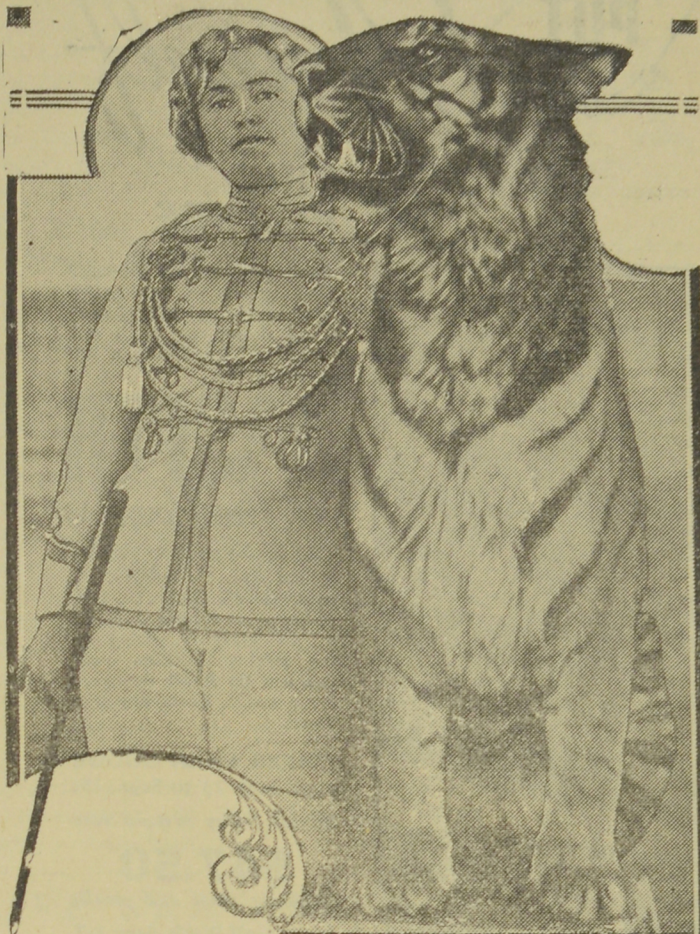

Was Not Aware
Ryan Was Married

ST. THOMAS, Ont., July 26—Until he read published stories yesterday quoting "Red" Ryan, paroled convict, as saying that letters from Ryan's wife were withheld from him while he served 14 years in Kingston penitentiary, former warden John C. Ponsford was unaware that Ryan was married, the ex-warden said here today.

Commenting briefly on Ryan's declaration that the withholding of letters caused an estrangement between the convict and his wife, Captain Ponsford said he recalled passing on certain letters addressed to Ryan which the prison censor subsequently withheld.

"About some of those letters," the ex-warden asserted, "I could tell you things that would make your hair stand on end." He added that if any letters were withheld from Ryan it was because they contained matter which under the regulations, was objectionable.

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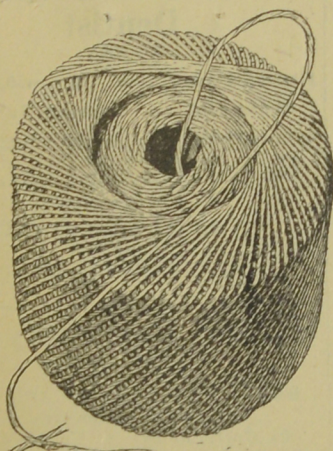
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
