## WES FERRELL BOB GROVE FIGHTING TYPE

Baseball Game is to Them Either Personal Gain or Loss—Both Do-or-Die.

Wes Farrell right now is the particular hero of Boston baseball fandom because of his ninth-inning home runs on two consecutive days to win games for the Hose. For he has delivered in story-book fashion and has done it twice for emphasis. So that the ace pitcher of the Hose is becoming more renowned for his hitting than his pitching.

Yet the chief factor in the Ferrell make-up is not his hitting or his pitching, both of which are high-grade, but rather the same temperament that is found in Robert Moses "Lefty" Grove, the trait which accepts every game as either a personal victory or a personal defeat.

Neither Ferrell nor Grove can accept a baseball game in which he is operating as just another day's work. Both are the fighting types. They want to win baseball games and they have, whether they would care to admit it or pass it off, a team spirit and loyalty. It will be remembered that Grove always was ready to work in those days when he seemed to be pitching two-thirds of the games for the Philadelphia Athletics. And Ferrell right now is doing just the same thing.

In the matter of pitching averages, Grove has the better percentage, for he has won 12 games and lost six, while Ferrell has been the winner 15 times and the loser 10 times. But Ferrell, had he not been one of the eager, hustling kind, would have had a better percentage. But he went in as relief pitcher, insisting on being given a chance to retrieve ball games. Hence his ten defeats.

### EXHIBITION RUGBY TOUR OF THE WEST

WINNIPEG, July 25—If negotiations now under way are successful, Canada's senior football and rugby champions may be seen in action in western Canada next fall.

Joe Ryan, president of the Winnipeg rugby club, announced yesterday he was in touch with officials of the arnia Imperials, 1934 titlists, attempting to work out a satisfactory schedule for an exhibition tour of the West.

A tentative schedule of seven games proposed by the Imperials, was unsatisfactory, Ryan said, but he was endeavoring to arrange a meeting between his club and Sarnia. He suggests one game be played here, Sept. 28.

As proposed, Imperials would play seven games during September. Winnipeg Sept. 4; Calgary Sept. 7; Vancouver, Sept. 11-14 Saskatoon, Sept. 18; Regina, Sept. 21, and Winnipeg, Sept. 23 or 24.

Ferrell was home, his trouble seemingly being a bad arm. Grove was trying to find life in his left arm, taking all sorts of cure-alls and hoping that each would be the panacea.

Grove was listed as a bad investment, but he never quit and Tom Yawkey and Eddie Collins stuck with him. And Collins and Yawkey gave ear to Rick Ferrell, their catcher, who insisted that brother Wes had the stuff with which to win ball games. And the result is that between them they have won 27 games, which it not at all bad.

The point is that neither is the great pitcher of the past. Neither has the power of the past, that hard one with a hop that smoked by the batter. But they are both pitching their hearts and minds, working the batters carefully and showing control and variety to take them to town. The ability to control the ball, to avoid giving the batter anything too good, has brought them to the spot where they are the talk of baseball.
