'Our Free Education' Presented by Intercollegiate Council Tonight

Two of the leading educators of the East will be presented by the Intercollegiate Council in an interesting discussion of "Our Free Education" as a highlight of the Columbia Broadcasting System's programs for tonight.

The educators are Dr. William Heard Kilpatrick, professor of philosophy of education at Columbia University, and Dr. Ned Harland Dearborn, dean of the division of general education, New York University, and they will address, in addition to the radio audience, organized listening groups comprising thousands of students, and alumni.

FREEDOM OF TEACHERS AND STUDENTS.

Dr. William Heard Kilpatrick, professor of philosophy of education, Columbia University, and Dr. Ned Harland Dearborn, dean of the division of general education, New York University, will discuss "Our Free Education" in the second of a series presented by the Intercollegiate Council on the WABC-Columbia network, Friday, July 26, from 6:00 to 6:15 P. M., A. S. T.

Dr. Kilpatrick will speak from the viewpoint of academic freedom of teachers and Dr. Dearborn will present the freedom of students angle. In addition to the general radio audience, there will be organized listening groups in university summer session classrooms and among 2,000 alumni organizations throughout the United States.

Dr. Kilpatrick was born in White Plains, Georgia, in 1871, and was graduated from Mercer University in 1891. He received his Ph.D. degree from Columbia University in 1912. Dr. Dearborn is a native of Conneautville, Pennsylvania, and obtained his Ph.D. from Columbia in 1925.

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
