

GOV'T TO SAVE BY AVOIDANCE VOTE REVISION

Substantial Saving Expected to be Made by this Procedure

Reform Electoral Laws

H. H. Morton Asked to Resign. No further Announcements of Change

In order to effect a substantial saving both to the province and to municipalities the provincial government has decided to avoid any revision this year of the provincial voters' lists. This information was given to The Daily Mail this morning by Premier Hon. A. A. Dysart.

Provision is made in the Election Act for the revision of the Provincial voters during September and October each year. The work is performed in each Parish by a Board of Revisors, consisting of the Chairman, who is appointed by the Government and paid by the Province, and two other members who are County Councillors and paid for their work by the County.

In cities and towns similar methods are employed. The annual cost runs into several thousands of dollars.

The existing voters lists are in effect until January 1st, next. It is the view of the Government that the electoral laws should be reformed, and pending such changes it is felt advisable to avoid any revision this year. This course will save substantial sums both for the Province and the Municipalities.

Following the meeting of the cabinet which finished its proceedings at noon today Premier Dysart was unable to make any further statement regarding the various appointments or dismissals in connection with the government offices.

It is understood however, that possibly there may be some more changes to follow an investigation into the various departments. It is felt that some of these departments are over-manned and it may be necessary to do some "pruning" here and there. The departments which it is said, will

EARLY BLIGHT GENERAL IS REPORT TODAY

Plant Pathologists Issue Statement on Potato Diseases in N. B.

Late Blight Found

Disease in Mild Form Is Not Considered Destructive

According to a statement given out this morning by officials at the Dominion Experimental Station early blight is general in the province but occurring only in mild form. Particularly it affects potatoes.

This disease is not considered destructive but undoubtedly affects the yield of plants by materially reducing the active leaf surface. It is characterized by brownish spots with concentric rings which occur on the leaves and stems. Late blight has also been found only in slight form in 3 localities. Warm humid conditions enhance the development of this disease. It is one of the most destructive maladies attacking the potato since it is capable of destroying the foliage as well as the tubers. The disease is successfully held in check in commercial field by the efficient manner in which growers are now utilizing suitable fungicides. The majority of growers use wet spray but a small minority are utilizing fungicides in dust form to good advantage.

The Dominion Laboratory recommends Bordeaux wet spray mixture 4-4-40 and the 20-80 dust mixture for the control of late blight. From 4 to 6 applications are usually necessary for efficient control. Virus diseases are somewhat lower than the average. These destructive maladies are maintained at a minimum in commercial fields by the use of Certified Seed and the strict vigilance of the inspectors of the Dominion Plant Pathological Service, which introduced the growing of certified seed into this Province about two decades ago. In the early days it was not uncommon to find from 50 to 100 per cent of virus diseases, even in commercial fields. Now most fields are well below two per cent total virus disease and many growers pride themselves on having stock that contains only a trace of these diseases.

Such minor maladies as blackleg and wilts have only been found in traces. The disease due to magnesium deficiency has been reported from only a few restricted localities. This disease is characterized by stunted growth, yellowing and dying of the foliage and dropping of the lower leaves. It can be held successfully in check by adding from 40 to 60 pounds of magnesium sulphate (Kieserite) or 100 pounds of dolomitic lime per acre in the fertilizer. A number of growers are now using these chemicals for the control of this disease.

Dr. Pettingill, Rev. Mr. Daggett In Fine Addresses

A large congregation was present last evening at the Reformed Baptist Church to hear Dr. Pettigill. His exposition of the twenty-second Psalm was a revelation to many.

Mr. Daggett gave a history of the movement under which the Bible conference operates. This is the seventh year in which such meetings have been held in N. S., and it is not impossible to go to all the places asking for a conference. The party is booked for three sessions and will leave here on Monday for Westchester, N. S. It was explained that the object was not the organization of a new denomination of new churches, but to assist and strengthen existing churches.

The conference is conducted on interdenominational lines. As is the Kingston Bible Lodge which is an outgrowth of the conference.

The special feature of the Sunday services will be Dr. Pettigill's address on the second coming of Christ at 3 P. M.
