transcription of "Holy Night" by Krechel, and Mendelssohn's "O Rest in the Lord." These selections were well chosen to demonstrate the quality of the instrument's rich organ tone, essential for the interpretation of classical organ literature, the purity of its tremulant and the capacity of its swell attachment.

The choir rendered two fine examples of church anthem "Whoso Dwelleth Under the Defence of the Most High," by George C. Martin, and Randecker's "Praise the Lord."

The address delivered at this service by Rev. J. W. Bartlett was upon the theme "The Sermon of the Organ." In this original sermon the pastor spoke of several characteristics of the Hammond organ and pointed to parallels in life.

The new building would serve as a drill and storehouse for military equipment having its main entrance on Campbell Street.

One government representative and two lumber industry representatives from each of the provinces of Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia comprise a committee which is meeting in Montreal today for the purpose of considering plans for the future it was announced here today.

New Brunswick's representatives on the lumber trade extension committee for Eastern Canada left the province yesterday to take part in this conference. The committee is responsible for the supervision of the activities of G. K. Fenson, Eastern Canada's timber commissioner in the United Kingdom.

The New Brunswick committee members who left for Montreal were G. H. Prince, deputy minister of lands and mines, representing the New Brunswick government and Ashley A. Colter of this city; also John E. Sayre of Saint John, representing the lumber industry of the province. Other members of the committee are as follows:

Nova Scotia—W. McL. Robertson, Halifax, representing the government and John Arklie, Halifax, and Rufus E. Dickie, Stewiacke, the lumber industry; Quebec—L. A. Daigle, Montreal, representing the government, and Hon. W. Gerald Power and N. F. Blair, Quebec City, the lumber industry.
