103rd Anniversary Celebrated With Special Sunday Services

Special Music

Rev. Mr. Telford Notes Various Changes in Century

For the past one hundred and three years St. Paul's church has been a vital factor in the religious and moral life of Fredericton. Formally organized as a congregation on Nov. 4, 1832, this church begins the one hundred and fourth year of its life today. Yesterday in bright and bracing weather, the anniversary was marked by appropriate and largely attended services conducted by the minister, Rev. George Telford.

In the morning the congregation met for the celebration of the Lord's Supper. The large gathering, the simple yet dignified service, the significance of the day in the life of the congregation, made the occasion more than usually impressive. The theme of the Communion address was "Ye are the Body of Christ." Under this metaphor lay the profound idea of the church as an organism, every part functioning in harmony with the whole. As the body must be kept in health, every organ under the control of the mind, so the church must needs study to have every member in healthy activity and all obedient to the spirit of Christ.

Evening Service

At the evening service the music was a special feature and was greatly enjoyed. Mr. Webber, at the prelude and offertory rendered very beautiful violin solos to the accompaniment of the organ. The male quartette sang "One Sweetly Solemn Thought," and the anthem by the choir was sung with fine spirit and expression. The sermon was on the theme "What the Years Have Wrought." Mr. Telford with a brief introduction, touching the beginning of St. Paul's church in 1832, proceeded to sketch the background of the church in the century through which its organized life has extended. That century was one of the greatest in the history of mankind. It had seen the most rapid and wonderful development of travel from the speed of a swift horse to the flight of an airship. Communication had been accelerated from the rate of a mail coach to the swiftness of light in the wireless waves. Railways, telephones, steamships, airships, radio had all come during this fateful century. In political, social and moral spheres the century was one of vast change and development.

DEDICATION OF NEW ORGAN AT WILMOT CHURCH

All - Electric Hammond Organ First of Kind Used in Canada

Dedicatory Service

Rev. J. W. Bartlett Traces Importance of Music in the Church

The voice of the old pipe organ is stilled in Wilmot church. As age gives way to virile youth the inventions of yesterday are displaced by the discoveries of today. The old tractor-type pipe organ which served and inspired Wilmot congregation for fifty-three years was dismantled a couple of weeks ago and yesterday morning the new all-electric Hammond organ was dedicated.

The installation of the new instrument was attended by a rearrangement of the seating in the choir loft. With the removal of the operating parts of the pipe organ a considerable gain in space was afforded by setting the case, with the large metal pipes intact, back several feet. The choir is arranged so that one section faces the congregation directly, two other sections are placed diagonally, the general effect being a semicircular formation. The console of the new Hammond is placed in front of the choir with the speaking parts, the power cabinets, placed inside the case of previous organ. This change has improved the general acoustics of the auditorium and allows complete development of the tone structure of both organ and choir.

The dedication service began with the responsive reading of Psalm one hundred and fifty, led by Rev. J. W. Bartlett. A scripture passage from the Second Book of Chronicles followed.

W. E. McMullen, superintendent of the Sunday School, made the official presentation.

On behalf of his congregation Rev. J. W. Bartlett accepted the organ. A dedication prayer was then reverently offered by Mr. Bartlett.

Appropriately, the first piece of music played in public worship was The Doxology. The offertory played by Professor F. W. Harrison was Dunham's "Intermezzo" after which an anthem "Blessed Be the God and Father," by Samuel Sebastian Wesley was rendered by the church choir.

An appropriate and effective address was delivered by Rev. J. W. Bartlett upon the text from Second Kings: "It came to pass when the minstrel played, the hand of the Lord came upon him." The address was based upon the theme of the relative worship.

The minstrel represents the emotional ingredient and the minister more of the intellectual. The time when everything in a service except the sermon was characterized "preliminaries" is gone and the passing of thank God for, Mr. Bartlett said.

Evening Service

A foretaste of the wealth of musical eloquence made available by the possession of the Hammond organ, was afforded by a fifteen minute recital by Professor Harrison immediately preceding the evening service. The selections played by the organist were "Canzone," by King Hall, a

LOCAL MAN IS SENTENCED ON LIQUOR CHARGE

William Kenny Given a \$200 Fine with Two Months' Jail

Other Cases Today

Take Evidence in Marysville Case—Clothesline Damage

The Fredericton police court was a busy place this morning, a number of cases being heard before Police Magistrate Walter Limerick. Wm. Kenny of this city, pleaded guilty to a charge of keeping liquor for sale at his premises on October 26, and was sentenced to a fine of \$200 and two months in the York county jail, with an additional two months in default of payment.

Several drunks appeared in court and were sentenced to fines of \$8 and costs. The case of the King vs. Theodore Burgess of Douglas, was set over until November 14, and the accused released on bail on a charge of property damage.

Marysville Case

Three Marysville youths appeared before Police Magistrate Walter Limerick in the police court this morning all of the juvenile age, charged with damage to clotheslines of private property which occurred on federal election night. Witnesses included the accused three, Town Marshall Arnold of Marysville; James Carson and Miss Thelma Saunders. Magistrate Limerick adjourned the case until tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock for judgment. Arthur McF. Limerick appeared for the prosecution and Leo F. Cain for the defence.
