To the strains of the National Anthem His Excellency Lord Bessborough, retiring Governor General of Canada and Lady Bessborough, made their entry into the assembly chamber of the Parliament Building last evening for the farewell reception to the people of New Brunswick given by His Honour Lieutenant Governor Col. Murray MacLaren. The affair was a brilliant one charmingly arranged, and the most outstanding function given in the province for some time. Their Excellencies, escorted by their aides-de-camp Captain D. Fisher-Rowe and Captain M. E. Adeane were met at the entrance of the Parliament Building by His Honour the Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. MacLaren, the party proceeding to the Members' Room and into the Assembly Chamber where several hundred guests were received by Their Excellencies Lord and Lady Bessborough and His Honour the Lieutenant Governor Col. and Mrs. Murray MacLaren following which the farewell address from the province of New Brunswick was read by Premier A. A. Dysart. Later dancing to orchestra music was led off by Lord Duncannon son of Their Excellencies Lord and Lady Bessborough and Miss Hope Hanson daughter of Hon. Dr. R. B. Hanson.

Supper was served at eleven o'clock in the Corporation Committee Room

which was artistically arranged for the occasion by the members of the Anagwakade Chapter of the I.O.D.E., who also catered for the supper and were highly complimented for their efficient service. The tables were centred with bowls of garden flowers and candelabra with green tapers at each end. Huge bouquets of summer flowers were placed in the windows and at various points in the room, the effect being most pleasing.

Her Excellency Lady Bessborough was charming in a gown of periwinkle blue lame shot with silver. She wore blue slippers carrying a blue evening bag and the flowers which had been presented to her at the civic reception yesterday afternoon by the citizens of Fredericton.

CHANGES IN
WORK METHOD

MINTO, Sunbury Co., July 22—A verdict that death was caused by an unforeseen slip of rock while he was at work as a miner and a recommendation that back brushing—the raising of the height of a level of a mine—be done in one direction only were returned by the coroner's jury at the inquest held tonight in Minto Memorial Hall into the death of Jack Riley 30. The inquest was conducted by Coroner Alexander Burnett, of Oromocto, and F. H. Peters, Fredericton, was present as representative of the attorney general. Six witnesses were examined.

Riley was killed instantly by a fall of rock in the Black Diamond mine of Welton and Henderson Ltd., at New-castle Bridge, Queens county, Friday afternoon.

Eno Corpi, working with Riley at the time of the accident, said two crews were engaged in retimbering an old level. There was only one old timber to be removed when the fall of rock occurred. He was 20 feet behind Riley and he saw the fall of rock. Riley being buried completely. It took two hours to extricate the man.

Improvement was noted this afternoon in the condition of J. Howard Richards, who is ill at his home on University Avenue.

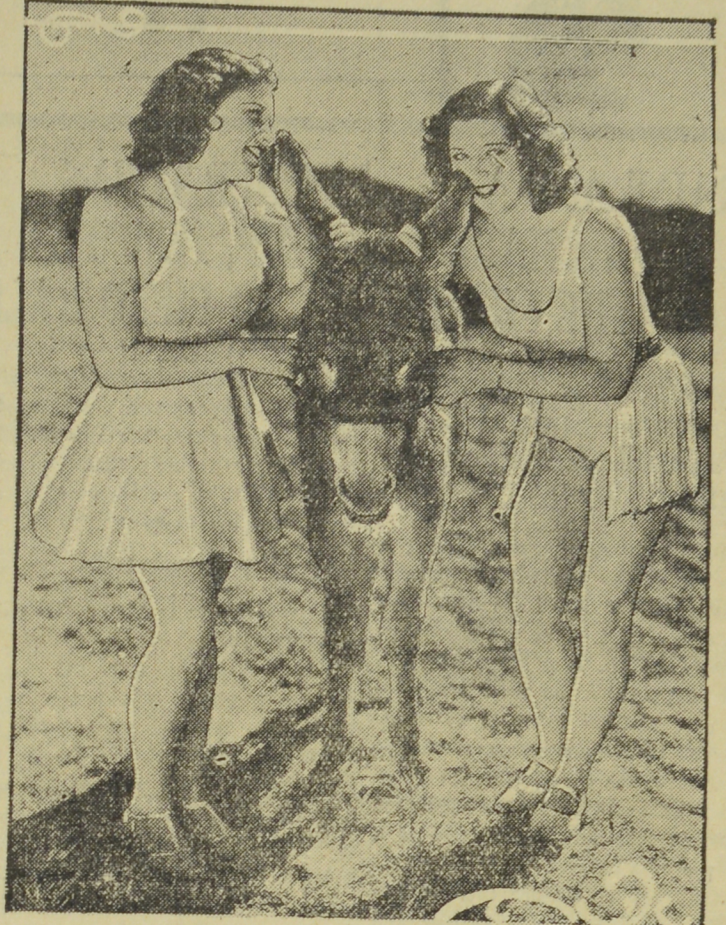
APPLE DAMAGE
