THE COMING SESSION

On Thursday next the fifth and last session of the 17th Legislature will be called together. This will be the last session before a general election. These elections will probably be called in the early summer probably in May or June although no person in authority has yet made any statement. There are at present thirty-two candidates in the field in eleven of the seventeen constituencies. Of these the Liberal opposition has twenty-one candidates in seven ridings while the Conservatives have nominated eleven in four constituencies. So far as nominating candidates the Liberals have probably been more active. In other respects they do not seem to be overly energetic.

In the last general election, held June 19, 1930 the Conservative government of Hon. J. B. M. Baxter was returned with 31 seats out of a total of 48. The present administration of Hon. L. P. D. Tilley has 26 supporters excluding the Speaker. The Liberals led in the House by Hon. A. A. Dysart K. C., number 15. Five Conservative seats and one Liberal are vacant. In three by-elections held since the 1930 general election the Cons. gained a seat from the Liberals in Gloucester County and retained a seat in each of the two counties of Saint John and Westmorland.

Since the last general election two premiers, now Chief Justice Baxter, and Mr. Justice C. D. Richards, who succeeded the former as Conservative leader, resigned in order to take places on the New Brunswick supreme court bench. Premier Richards was succeeded in 1933 by Mr. Tilley, who retained the portfolio of minister of lands and mines.

The coming session of the House will probably be an extended one as most sessions preceding a general election provide lots of opportunity for campaign talk in both sides of the house.

The provincial government it appears has an extensive programme, which includes some new and important legislation.

Four vacancies which occurred since the last session were created by appointments of J. W. Smith, Kings, as registrar of deeds for Kings County; Miles E. Agar, Saint John City, as a member of the New Brunswick Liquor Control Board; H. Colby Smith Saint John County, as sheriff for Saint John County, and J. M. Scott, York, as registrar of deeds for York County. Premier Richards' resignation created the other Conservative vacancy. The single Liberal vacancy occurred when J. E. Michaud, Madawaska, resigned to contest Restigouche-Madawaska in a Dominion by-election. He won the seat.

Hon. Dr. and Mrs. Veniot have an interesting family of six sons, who occupy leading positions in their native town and elsewhere. Three of these boys did their part in the Great War. The Daily Mail extends congratulations to Hon. Dr. and Mrs. Veniot and wishes them many more years of health and happiness.

MARKETING ACT INFORMATION

A very instructive publication embracing the whole subject of the Na-

tural Products Marketing Act, 1934, has been issued by the Dominion Marketing Board. Full information is given on all points, including a guide to the preparation of marketing schemes. The background of present legislation with world-wide data is effectively dealt with by Dr. J. F. Booth, Commissioner, Dominion Economics Branch, while a clear and concise exposition of the Act itself is contributed by Dr. G. H. S. Barton, Dominion Deputy Minister of Agriculture, the Chairman of the Board. The marketing schemes approved by the Board up to December 1, 1934, are set forth, namely, B. C. Three Fruit; Fruit Export Marketing; B. C. Red Cedar Shingle; B. C. Dry Salt Herring and Dry Salt Salmon; and the Ontario Fluecured Tobacco. In the guide to the preparation of marketing schemes, information is given as to the initial procedure to be taken in drafting the scheme and the method of handling thereafter.

BERTHIERVILLE CONTRACT LET OUT

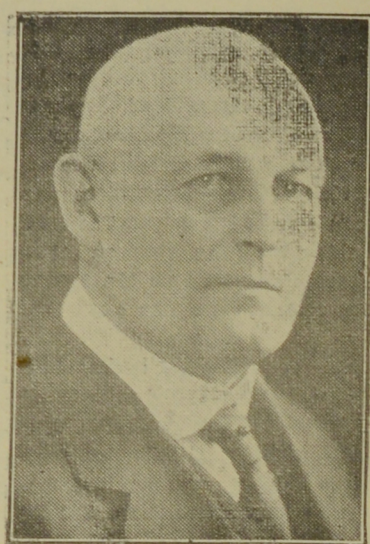

New Governor Was Sworn-in Today

The Clerk of the Privy Council or his representative advanced and handed the Bible to the Chief Justice, who presented the same to the Lieut. Governor who held it in his right hand (having previously stepped down from the Dais). The Lieut. Governor then read the Oath of Allegiance and kissed the Bible. The Chief Justice then read to the Lieut. Governor the Oath of Office, etc. and the Lieut. Governor kissed the Bible. After the Lieut. Gov-

ernor inscribed his name the Chief Justice attested the jurat.

The Great Seal of the Province was then placed in the hands of the Lieut. Governor by the Clerk of the Privy Council or his representative. The Provincial Secretary then left his place at the table and advanced to the Lieutenant Governor who handed the Great Seal to him saying:

"To Your Safe Custody I Commit The Seal of The Province of New Brunswick."

The Provincial Secretary then returned to his place at the table with the Great Seal.

The Clerk of the Privy Council or representative then handed to the Lieutenant-Governor his book of Instructions which the latter in turn handed to his Secretary.

It is customary to present the Bible used in the ceremony to the Lieutenant Governor as a souvenir of the occasion.

The Lieutenant-Governor then proceeded to the Executive Council Chamber where the Prime Minister and members of the Cabinet were sworn-in under the new Lieutenant-Governor.

After the installation of Hon. Dr. Murray MacLaren as lieutenant-governor of the province this afternoon, the new governor before leaving the throne made the following remarks: "I trust with the Grace of God to fulfill the duties of this high office in accordance with the constitution and laws of this beloved province."

Lieut. Gov. MacLaren arrived here on his own special car today at noon and was immediately taken to "Acacia Grove," where he will reside during the session of the Legislature. Mrs. MacLaren and daughter, Miss Margaret, arrived here a few days ago.

Board of Education Confer This Morning

The Board of Education held a meeting here this morning with all members of the Board present. Among other things District No. 9 in the Parish of Kingsclear, county of York was re-opened and the boundary between Districts No. 9 and 12 defined. The schools in those districts had been closed for some time due to the fact that the farms in that area had been unoccupied. Lately need has been found to re-open the schools.

District No. 14, in the parish of Aberdeen, Carleton County was authorized by the school to borrow \$300 for the purpose of an addition to the school house in that district. Two departments will be made. Also the Kiwanis Club of St. Stephen was authorized to sponsor a musical contest in Charlotte County and to put up a shield for competition. Decision was made to give credit to students holding grammar school licenses who had taken special study for this purpose at U. N. B.

PRIEST SPURNS CASH ON HANGER INVENTION

Only Stipulation is Manufacturers Give Word to Needy Parishioners.

Bowmansville, N. Y., Feb. 8—When Parishioners of Sacred Heart Church complained to Rev. Father Edward F. Ott, about the wardrobe in the parish hall and its damaging effect on the coats and hats they left there, he agreed that something should be done. First he devised a hanger, with a bag attached for rubbers and a snap catch on a chain for the hat. This device was widely copied and now is found in many places.

Now the priest has devised a new hanger on which patents are pending in Washington. A garment hanger company has taken over production of the device. He has refused royalties on his invention on condition that manufacturing work be given to more than a score of his needy parishioners. Many are fabricating in homes, and unemployed parishioners act as salesmen for the device.

Besides the hanger he has invented a collapsible rack which may be placed in small rooms. It is of simple construction and when taken down may be stored in a small place. In 15 minutes, one man can assemble enough racks to accommodate from 400 to 1,000 persons.

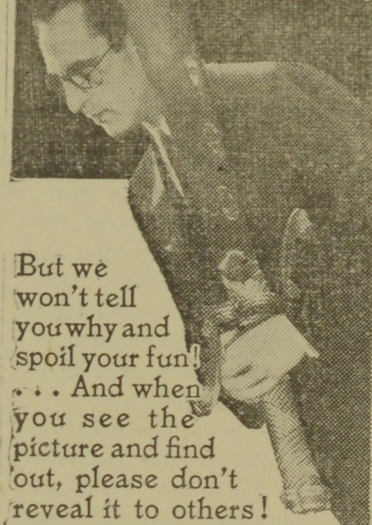
