

### LATE J. B. ARNOLD HAD RELATIVES IN THIS VICINITY

Well Known U. S. Atty.  
Passed Away at Du-  
luth on Monday

Born on Nashwaak

The late John B. Arnold, a practising attorney in Superior and Duluth for a period of forty-six years and who was born in the Nashwaak river valley, despite a first report to the contrary had relatives in this vicinity.

The late Mr. Arnold was born on the Nashwaak river valley, son of the late Mattie and Allen Amos Arnold, one of the earliest settlers. Mr. and Mrs. Arnold and son, accompanied by Mr. Arnold's father, visited here some twenty years with a view to buying the old home, then owned by James Gibson. The late Mr. Arnold is survived by many relatives residing in New Brunswick.

Among these are Mrs. Marjorie Love, of Devon; Mrs. John Moore, of Penniac; Mrs. Ida Minue, formerly of Fredericton and now of Saint John; Miss Sada Walker and Mrs. Mabel V. Mackey of Marysville. Also there are relatives in the vicinity of Stanley, N. B. Mrs. Mabel V. Mackey of Marysville is a cousin.

The late Mr. Arnold went to school at Penniac and was a classmate of ex-Alt. C. N. Goodspeed.

Deceased passed away on Monday at Duluth and he had been in ill-health for some time. He was born on May 26, 1866 and spent his youth here. Announcement of the late Mr. Arnold's death appeared in yesterday's issue of the Daily Mail with full particulars.

Memorial Expeditionary  
Force Will Sail From  
Montreal in 1936

Vimy Pilgrimage

No Definite Plans Made  
By Legion Branch  
Here

Twenty-one years ago a flotilla of passenger liners entered the pages of the world's history as the largest troopship convoy ever known. The flotilla carried the First Canadian Contingent. In it were crack liners of the Canadian Pacific, White Star and Cunard Lines, and in them eager young Canadians fired by patriotism, curiosity and the spirit of adventure.

Next year history is to repeat itself. Once again some of those same Canadians, not so young now, will embark in ships of the Canadian Pacific and Cunard-White Star lines for France and the hallowed little bit of Canada known to them as Vimy Ridge.

But in other respects history will repeat itself when, towards the end of June, 1936, a memorial expeditionary force sets sail from Montreal to tour the battlefields of 20 years ago, and attend the unveiling of Walter Allward's magnificent memorial to Canada's dead. Members of the Canadian Legion here are expected to participate in the great event in 1936.

The official pilgrimage to Vimy is sponsored by the Canadian Legion of the B. E. S. L. for Canadian and Imperial veterans, and has the blessing of Ven. Archdeacon Scott, beloved war-time padre, who recently paid his deposit and became the "number one pilgrim". Early estimates of the number expected to attend range from three to five thousand. The figures include women and children, as many of the C. E. F. veterans are planning to avail themselves of the opportunity presented by the low, inclusive rate to take their families.

F. I. Haviland, secretary of the local branch, stated today that while the local branch will co-operate in this venture, that so far nothing of a definite nature had been arranged for the branch here. It is understood, however, that the members here will participate in the pilgrimage, as well as all other parts of Canada. Mr. Haviland opines that the cost per person will not exceed the amount of \$160 and will probably be much lower.

Included in the fare will be ocean transportation, meals, billeting and land transportation in France, and bed and breakfast during the London stay after the official ceremony at Vimy. Three and a half weeks will be the length of the tour.

In many ways the memorial expeditionary force will remind its members of their previous crossing of the Atlantic. C. E. F. Unit identities are to be maintained as far as is possible.

A tour of the battlefields is to precede the ceremonies on the ridge, then again boarding the Trans-Atlantic ships the contingent will go to London. Four days are to be spent in the metropolis where further ceremonies have been planned, and the return voyage to Canada will be commenced from the great Thames port.

### ENCOURAGING REPORT OF HAY IN MAUGERVILLE

Splendid Hay Crop Was  
Raised There Last  
Season

Exceptional Quality

Part That Spring Fresh-  
et Plays in Periodic  
Crop in That Area

Farmers of Maugerville who visited the city from day to day speak encouragingly of the splendid hay crop, which has been raised there this year and also the good prevailing prices. Good hay from that part of the country is now selling for \$12 and \$13 per ton. One man who has two farms in Maugerville this year raised as high as 250 tons of hay. The exceptional quality of the hay is due to the spring freshet which prevailed last year, and which resulted in a large amount of foreign matter which was washed into the fields and helped to fertilize them. This had the effect during the past season of making the hay crop an exceptionally good one and the prices that are prevailing are the best in five years.

Newcomers to Maugerville are often discouraged by the fact that there is a spring freshet almost every year and about every ten years this freshet is a serious one. The old timers whose families have lived in Maugerville for generations do not take this high water business very seriously because

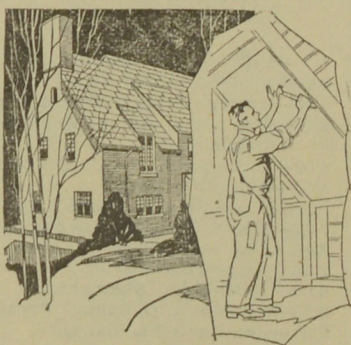

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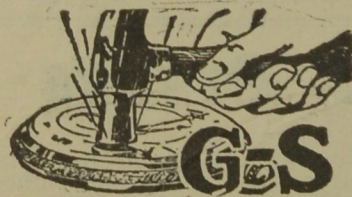
