Sammy McManus Is Bought by Patrick

Former Moncton Hawk Star Will Strengthen Philadelphia Ramblers in International League.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 30—Hockey deals "on the fire" for days were consummated right and left when Lester Patrick, the "silver fox" of New York's Rangers, came to terms yesterday with Tommy Gorman, Montreal Maroons' manager.

Sammy McManus, former Moncton Hawk, who played left wing for the Maroons, was sold outright to the Rangers when the two National Hockey League mentors figuratively put their heads together on the long-distance telephone between strenuous practice sessions on the ice.

Patrick, now in Calgary, where the Rangers open a three-game exhibition series tonight, secured McManus for an unstated amount of cash. McManus will go to Rangers farm team, the Philadelphia Ramblers, and will line up with the Canadian-American leaguers tomorrow night when they play an exhibition game against Gorman's Stanley Cup champions.

Byrdson is Injured in Practice Game

WINNIPEG, MAN., Oct. 30—Lester Patrick and his 15 New York Rangers entrained Sunday for Calgary, where they will engage in a three-game hockey exhibition series.

Bill Cook, who had an increase in his family left Winnipeg a day early to visit his wife at Regina's general hospital. He appeared at Ranger's camp here for a brisk workout and hurried westward shortly afterwards. He joined the main squad when they passed through Saskatchewan's capital Monday morning.

Glen Byrdson, a forward obtained recently from St. Louis Eagles, worked on the Rangers first line with Bun Cook and Frankie Boucher Saturday but before the scrimmage was over he was removed because of an injury.

The Boston Bruins and the Montreal Canadiens are supplying the New Brunswick sport fans with their hockey until the native players get into action. They expect to play a series starting this week in Halifax and ending up next week in Charlotte-town. Too bad we couldn't have a team in the Maritimes representing us in the N.H.L.

"Battler" Boyce, that high pressure promoter from the Cotton Town is trying to stir up a little action along the hockey line, and, according to his own words, is not doing too badly in reviving the winter pastime of Marysville. He says he has several of the Fredericton Cubs signed up to play with his team this season and that the veteran coach, Larry McLean, is all booked to coach the boys. Such stars as the McLenahan brothers, Bus and Bun, and Hattie Mills are mentioned as having pledged their support to Marysville this winter. These, along with the several players from Devon who are said to be ready to take the ice for the cotton town, would make a strong team. Pending receipt of travelling expenses Billy is in Saint John getting into shape with the Beavers.

Len LeBlanc, a team mate of Gulliver, is at present working out with the Pittsburgh Shamrocks at Hamilton under the tutelage of Sprague Cleghorn, former big league star who coached the Edmundston Eskimos to the Maritime Intermediate championship last year.

Seeing that so many of the team which had a very difficult time eliminating Fredericton last year are trying to procure berths on professional teams, it is odd that none of the Fredericton boys have never tried getting a job with some of the faster company. Sometimes funny things happen in professional hockey team training camps.
