

## BOY SCOUT NEWS

On Wednesday and Thursday, with John Hill and Ralph Lawrence of Nashwaak, we visited Bathurst, where we were the guests of Sheriff and Mrs. Melanson, at the Court House. While at Bathurst, we conferred with leaders, Rev. Father Hickey of the Catholic Troop and A. I. Tower of the Community Troop. Rev. Father Hickey now has 20 boys, and on Thanksgiving Day these went to Chatham to play a football match with Rev. Father Wynn's boys at Chatham.

Bathurst Scouts have planned an Apple Day.

Last summer, with the help of Cubmaster, Owen Oliver, of Toronto, a Wolf Cub Pack of 15 boys was started at Bathurst, under Philip Loosen.

On Thursday afternoon, in company with His Excellency Bishop Chiasson, we visited the Sacred Heart College Troop. His Lordship and myself addressed the boys in French, expressing satisfaction with progress made. This troop contains 15 boys, most of whom are completely uniformed. A very excellent meeting was held, knotting being made a feature of it. Complete photographic records are made of all troop activities, and the meeting which we attended was filmed.

On Thursday evening, we visited Scoutmaster Gordon Jago, at Clifton. He now has 18 boys, and they have built themselves a headquarters in the parish. Since leaving Clifton, the Rev. Ray Smith has started a troop at Campobello, last summer. There are 10 boys, and visitors to Campobello subscribed \$50.00 towards the new troop.

Capt. Hague reports from Hartland as follows: Last Monday, the Hartland Scout committee met for the first time. Rev. L. Giddings of the United Church, was nominated Scoutmaster, and Capt. Hague, official A. S.M. Principal Wiley of the school and Mr. Trotter and also Assistants. A committee of two, Mr. Wiley and Mr. D. J. MacLeod, were asked to see about a hall for meetings. Mr. Trotter volunteered to be secretary and advisor, and is doing admirably well. The committee is composed of the following: Rev. L. Giddings, Capt. Hague, Mr. Trotter, Principal Wiley and Messrs. C. F. Dunham, D. L. MacLeod and Wendall Nixon. It was decided to meet on Fridays, at 7 p.m.

Principal Pelkey of Juniper has started a Wolf Cub Pack. This meets at Juniper on Saturdays, at 2 p.m.

Waterville, Carleton County, are to have a Patrol of Scouts, in connection with Hartland, under two brothers, Richard and Robert Neill.

Some progress with Lone Scouts is being made in the above area, the first one to come in being Howard Irving, of Coldstream East.

On Friday, we visited the new Durham-Nashwaak Village Scout Troop, members of the party besides myself being District Commissioner G. Alvah Good and the following Rover Scouts of the Third Fredericton Crew: Cumming, Locke, F. Feeney and G. Feeney. A very satisfactory meeting was held.

On Saturday, we visited the Lower Prince William Troop, with Vincent McAuley, an old friend of the Centreville Troop, and Cyril Gray, an old King's Scout of the First Woodstock Troop. A good meeting was held in the open, with an investiture at the close, when five recruits were invested as Tenderfoot, Vincent McAuley acting as A.S.M. to Mr. Barker. He also passed one recruit in the Tenderfoot knots, while Cyril Gray passed another boy in part of the Junior Fire Warden Badge. This troop now has twenty boys.

Rev. Father Moore reports a membership for the Second Woodstock Group, of forty-one boys, while the First Woodstock Troop, under Rev. S. C. Gray, continues to do admirable work, with a membership as large as ever. At a Confirmation service held at Woodstock on Sunday, several of the boys confirmed are Scouts in Mr. Gray's Troop, while at the service, I carried the Archbishop's Cross, and read portions of the Scripture appointed.

## A Unique Gathering

An interesting discussion took place recently in New York conducted by the Herald-Tribune and attended by 3,000 women. Secretary of State Hull said that his country was determined to avoid war but it had a more difficult task than that—to exert an enormous moral influence in support of

peace and the peaceful settlement of controversies. Norman H. Davies, the president's ambassador at large said "the only absolute guarantee of keeping out of war is that there shall be no war."

Sir Samuel Hoare, speaking from London, said, "the British people stood behind the League in its steady determination to resist all acts of unprovoked aggression and to substitute peaceful methods of settlement for the old methods of war." Paul Reynaud of Paris, said that uncertainty could only be removed by the re-establishment of international trade, currency stabilization and a general return to a common gold standard.

The discussing was unique in that some of those taking part were divided by the Atlantic, but were all speaking to a common purpose. Sir Josiah Stamp told the gathering that of all national relationships the Anglo-American was the most important for the immediate future of the world.
