

## YOUNG PEOPLE'S UNION MET HERE IN CONVENTION

Rev. D. T. I. Forsyth Spoke Impressively at Meetings

### Resolutions Passed

Speakers Stress Youth's Problems in a Changing World

The Representatives of the United Church of Canada Young People's Societies in the Fredericton Presbytery met at Wilmo United Church vestry yesterday afternoon and evening to hear reports from the various societies and to elect a slate of officers for the Young People's Union of the Presbytery. The Reverend D. T. I. Forsyth who is travelling secretary for young people's work of the United Church in the Maritimes and Quebec, addressed both meetings. The Rev. Mr. Forsyth's words at both meetings were felt to be pertinent and effective. Harold Manzer, president of the Young People's Union, presided at both meetings.

The afternoon meeting opened with a devotional period conducted by Rev. Reginald Barker. Mr. Barker read scripture passages from Psalms ninety-one and ninety-six, and gave a short devotional address on the text, "O Worship the Lord in the Beauty of Holiness".

The afternoon session was taken up with business matters to a large extent. Rev. Gordon Pringle of Minto was appointed secretary of the convention. The hearing of reports from the Societies represented, was transacted. The societies heard from eleven in all were: Wilmo, St. Paul's (both of Fredericton), Gibson (South Devon), Marysville, Kingsley, Upper Keswick, Keswick Ridge, Prince William Doaktown, Gagetown, and Grand Lake.

Mr. Forsyth, then delivered a short powerful address on the subject, "Christian Youth Building a New World". Mr. Forsyth's thorough understanding of the youth problem gives him authority to speak on this subject and his address did full justice to the theme.

The report of the nominating committee was read by Mrs. Guy Pond of Fredericton. The slate of officers submitted and unanimously elected was as follows: President, Rev. Gordon Pringle, of Minto; secretary-treasurer, Mrs. Austin Squires, of Fredericton; convener of fellowship, John Arnold of Marysville; convener of missions, Mrs. Gordon Pringle, of Minto; convener of citizenship, Edgeron Jewett of Sheffield; convener of culture, Miss Annie Darrah of Keswick Ridge; convener of leadership training, Miss Jean Dingee of Gagetown; convener of recreation, Rev. John Copp. The installation of these officers was deferred until it could be ascertained if all those on the slate would agree to act, there being some

### New York Sheriff

Arthur McF. Limerick Named Sitting Police Magistrate

Among the provincial appointments made known in this week's Royal Gazette are four in York County. One of these is the appointment of Clarence N. Goodspeed of this city as York county sheriff replacing Sheriff Roy W. Smith, who has been dismissed for cause, to become effective October 31. The appointment of the new sheriff was exclusively verified in yesterday's issue of The Daily Mail.

### Holds Three Offices

Arthur McF. Limerick, son of Police Magistrate Walter Limerick, will be the office holder of the three other York county appointments made. He will be sitting police magistrate for the city of Fredericton, sitting judge of the city of Fredericton Civil Court, and also a justice of the peace. In the first two offices Mr. Limerick is successor to E. Allison MacKay, who is at present acting in the capacity of sitting magistrate in the absence of the police magistrate.

Other dismissals include that of Thomas Ellsworth of Dalhousie as sheriff of the county of Restigouche, which became effective on October 21, and who was replaced by John B. Legere of Dalhousie. There were five resignations in the city of Edmundston.

## CONFERENCE ON RELIEF - GOV'T MUNICIPALITIES

Cabinet to Meet Municipal Delegates Tomorrow

### F'ton Represented

Executive of Union of N. B. Municipalities Meets Here Tonight

A conference between the provincial government and representatives of the various New Brunswick municipalities will be held in the city tomorrow morning, commencing at ten o'clock at which time a thorough discussion on relief for the coming winter will be held, it was intimated here today. Several members of the cabinet are here today, including Premier A. A. Dunsart.

An executive meeting of the New Brunswick Union of Municipalities is taking place this evening in the city hall. Members of the executives of the Union are here today including Dr. C. J. Veniot, mayor of Bathurst; George Gilbert, and B. C. Mullins, of Bathurst; and Mayor King and J. A. Robinson, of Moncton. Mayor Britain of Saint John and others are expected tonight.

Arthur McF. Limerick, secretary-treasurer of the Union indicated today that the discussions of the executive this evening will center about a list of resolutions which will be presented before the government within the near future. The resolutions concern special problems of the various municipalities it is understood.

## PULP DRIVE TO BE COMPLETED WITHIN 10 DAYS

2,000 Cords Already Being Rafted at the Mitchell Boom

### River Level Higher

Total of 10,000 Cords to be Sent to Port Royal Pulp and Paper Co.

The first of five giant rafts of pulpwood, each raft containing 2,000 cords, was sent today from the Mitchell Boom below this city, to the storage pool at the Union Point plant of the Port Royal Pulp & Paper Co., Ltd. Activity in connection with the rafting of the pulp below this city has been going on for several days. Pulpwood driving operations have been carried on most intensively in the vicinity of Springhill where in the last few days, because of a rise in the river level pulp has been "sacked" off the shores and floated down river to the Mitchell boom. Many workmen have been engaged.

It is anticipated by officials of the company that the remaining 8,000 cords of pulpwood will be sent to Saint John within ten days. While 10,000 cords are being driven this year, in other years a total of almost 50,000 cords was rafted.

After the rafting process carried out at the Mitchell boom the pulpwood is conveyed to Saint John by the tugboat, "Daniel". The officials of the Saint John company are anxious to complete their pulpwood driving before the cold weather sets in and the next few days will be busy ones since the officials fully realize that cold weather is not far off.
