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APPEAL COURT HEARS SEVERAL UNUSUAL CASES

Actions Originating In Moncton, St. George and Bristol Argued—St. George Aldermanic and Mayoralty Election Disputed—Want Election Quashed.

The Appellate Division of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick which began its June sessions yesterday, heard argument in three unusual cases yesterday. These cases originated in Moncton, St. George and Bristol. Chief Justice Baxter, Mr. Justice Grimmer and Mr. Justice LeBlanc, who comprised the court are to give their decision today in connection with a preliminary objection taken on the Moncton case, ex parte A. E. McSweeney, a Moncton taxpayer.

J. F. H. Teed, K.C., St. John, appearing with T. T. Goodwin, K.C., of Moncton, for the Moncton Board of Assessors, who were summoned to show cause against an order nisi for mandamus by Chief Justice Barry, took preliminary objection, submitting that the matter was not properly before the court because, he contended, a single judge in chambers had no power to issue a summons of this nature.

The application on behalf of Mr. McSweeney was two-fold. It would compel the Board of Assessors to assess property of The T. Eaton Co. (Maritimes) Ltd., for 1933 and 1934, as provided by the Moncton Assessment Act or to compel the Moncton City Council to recommend to the board a chartered accountant to verify the tax returns made by the company in 1932 and 1933 and to assess property of the company for those years if a taxable income is shown.

The chief justice remarked that the idea that a judge could be final in the matter of mandamus was startling to him. Mr. Justice LeBlanc pointed out that it seemed to be admitted as the practice, whether it was right or wrong, and that "possibly the court has been wrong for 40 years, with eminent judges sitting."

A preliminary objection by P. J. Hughes, K.C., Fredericton, that not sufficient notice of motion was given, was sustained by the court in an application to be made by W. Arthur I. Anglin, St. John, on behalf of H. Vaughan Dewar, St. George merchant, for an order to exhibit an information in the nature of a quo warranto against the mayor and five aldermen of St. George to answer and show by what authority they claim to hold and exercise their offices.

This was placed on the motion paper of the docket today but because of the preliminary objection Mr. Anglin will not move until the second Friday of the session, June 14. On that date also he will ask for a rule absolute for a writ of certiorari to issue to bring up the proceedings on an election and declaration of an election and documents relating to the same with a view to quashing the election.

Mr. Anglin contended today that the election was not held according to law, more nominations being filed than there were vacancies. The town clerk closed the nominations at 5 p.m., instead of at 6 p.m. on nomination day, April 12 last, he continued. Between 5 and 6 o'clock, nominations were made and accepted but later disregarded, he claimed. The Incorporation Act provided that the closing time was 6 o'clock, although the public notice had stated 5 o'clock, Mr. Anglin said.

Holding Office Illegally? The mayor, Louis Rubin, and five aldermen, Arthur W. Stewart, Joseph McHugh, Harley Dow, Alfred E. Patterson and Frederick Tatton, were holding office illegally, he maintained.

A third unusual case was the appeal in an action which had been tried twice in the Carleton circuit court. W. P. Jones, K.C., and C. J. Jones, K.C., Woodstock, for the defendant, moved for a reduction of damages or for a reference to a matter or referee to reassess damages or for a new trial for assessment damages in the case of Mrs. Minnie Bell Noble, Bristol, administratrix of the estate of her husband, Leighton A. Noble, vs. the Bath, Bristol and Florenceville hydro electric district commissioners. Mr. Hughes had not completed his argument contra before court adjourned until tomorrow at 10.30 a.m.

This action was tried first at the Carleton circuit court in August 1934, before Mr. Justice Richards and a jury and on answers of the jury a verdict was entered for the plaintiff for \$9,000. Mrs. Noble had sued on behalf of herself and children after her husband came to his death through an electric shock from current supplied by the defendants. He died on May 10, 1933. The jury found that there was negligence by the defendant and also by the deceased and they apportioned the degrees of fault at 90 percent to the defendants and ten percent to the deceased. The amount of compensation found by the jury in the first trial was \$10,000 and the trial judge deducted ten percent and entered a verdict for \$9,000 against the defendant.

From this verdict, an appeal was taken before the appeal court, and the finding of the jury as to negligence and the apportionment of default was allowed to stand but a new trial was ordered for the assessment to damages.

Chief Justice Baxter today stated

the court could not consider a reference to a master. He thought it "most unfortunate" that the second jury did not give a smaller verdict than had the first. "That was why we sent it back," he declared.
