

## APPEAL COURT ADJOURNS TO THURS., JUNE 13

Completed Most of June  
Docket at Busy Session  
This Morning

### McSweeney Judgment

T. T. Goodwin, Moncton,  
Is Called to Inner Bar  
As a K. C.

The New Brunswick Appeal Court, which began its June session on Tuesday, delved deeply into its June docket this morning, completing all but one case and then adjourned until Thursday, June 13, when argument in the case of Fawcett et al vs. Fred G. Tingley will be heard.

This morning, T. T. Goodwin, of Moncton was called to the inner bar as a King's Counsel, and Chief Justice J. B. M. Baxter made suitable remarks in congratulation to Mr. Goodwin.

In ex parte Algernon McSweeney, in which T. T. Goodwin for the Board of Assessors of the city of Moncton appeared to show cause against an order nisi for mandamus, the court's opinion was that the judge of chambers cannot grant a writ of mandamus. Chief Justice Barry had granted one. Written reason for the judgment will be given later, the court decided. On material used before the chamber's judge and which was before the court today the rule nisi for mandamus was granted, returnable June 18, 1935.

Judgment was reserved in the case of Minnie Bell Noble, administratrix estate of Leighton A. Noble vs. Bath, & Co., Hydro-Electric District Commissioners. W. P. Jones, K.C., for the defendant, and P. J. Hughes, K.C., argued the case.

The case of Albert Roy Fawcett et al, executors, &c., vs. Fred Tingley, et al, will be taken up when the Court meets on Thursday next.

## NEWS BRIEFS

### TO SOLEMNIZE MARRIAGES

### MATTER OF THE DUMP

In connection with a request from a sideshow concessioner to be permitted to operate a merry-go-round at the city dump this year the City Council briefly discussed the "dump" several aldermen declaring that the dump was no fit place for children at any time. His Worship Mayor Clark asserted that action will have to be taken shortly to have something done about the "dump" in the west end of the city. Complaints have been received from time to time of the accumulated waste matter in that section of the city and many have urged that the dump be made at some other place.

### POLICE INVESTIGATED

Investigation of a report that an Indian, Samuel Thomas of Grand Falls, was in possession of a child believed to be of other parentage, was made recently by R. C. M. P. constables. Thomas in company with two women and two children was making his way by canoe from Grand Falls to Saint John. Only a few days ago at Lincoln another Indian, Joe Muse, reported to the police that Thomas had a white child in his possession. The incident was momentarily linked with the report of a disappearance in another part of the province. Investigation disclosed, however that the child belonged to Thomas, whose wife is of French and English descent. The child's white curly hair and fair face had caused a Fredericton lady to make a report to the police at about the same time as had Muse.

## CITY'S PAVING WORK WILL BEGIN IN NEAR FUTURE

Queen Street West and  
Road to Experimental  
Sta. To Be Done

### Employ Local Men

Provincial Govt. Agrees  
To Pay Fifty Per Cent  
of Expense

At the regular June meeting held in the city hall last evening, the city council passed a resolution that the city engineer be given authority to go ahead with a full paving program, according to agreement with the provincial government, the sections to be paved being the west end of Queen Street from Westmorland Street to the Victoria Public Hospital, and also the highway from the end of the paving on Waterloo Row to the Dominion Experimental Station. Both sections are considered "through" highway, and the government's agreement to paying half of the costs was read by His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark to the aldermen last evening.

The council considered the matter at some length and consideration was made of a tender submitted by a Fredericton contractor. His Worship Mayor Clark thought that "from the city's standpoint the work should be done by city employees". He felt that the people who are out of work should receive the advantage of this labor. Alderman Moses Mitchell was of the opinion that Currier & Seymour, contractors were the ones to do the work, since they lay the black-topped road, in common use.

The city already has bonded for the amount of \$40,000.00 to cover its share of the expense, and the government will bear the other half of the costs.

The council discussed the merits of different kinds of roadwork with the city engineer. It is planned to have the work rushed so as not to hold up traffic any during the summer months.

### TENDERS FOR HOME

Plans for the proposed addition and alterations to the Municipal Home were shown to the city council at its meeting last night and it was decided to call for tenders, which will close at noon on June 14. The plans were submitted for scrutiny by Ald. C. Hedley Forbes.

### MAIL'S SUGGESTION

Acting on the suggestion of The Daily Mail, the Women's Institute has made complaints respecting the matter of uncovered goods in stores, which is liable to disseminate disease germs. Last night a delegation from the Institute appeared before the city council and asked that a by-law be passed that all storekeepers keep produce such as fish, fruit, etc., covered. The Daily Mail urged this important step several weeks ago.

### APPOINT COMMITTEE

At the city council meeting last night the matter of continuing the exemption from water and other taxes of the Palmer-McLellan Co. Ltd., was considered. This institution had been exempted for a twenty-one year period, and a request had been made that the exemption be continued. However, it was stipulated, after consideration, that all three companies in that part of the city—John Palmer Co. Ltd., and Hart Boot and Shoe Company—be placed on a parity with respect to taxes. A motion, proposed by Ald. C. Hedley Forbes, that a committee be appointed to look into the matter with a view to having all three companies on a parity was seconded by Ald. David McCaughey, and passed. Several of the aldermen wondered if exemptions from the school tax is allowable under the statutes.

Products Act

### Fredericton Delegation

Milk Dealers of Saint

This afternoon a delegation of Fredericton milk and cream producers are appearing before the Commission to consider price and distribution matters in this area. The delegation is expected to present petitions from this area.

The commission also has received a request from Fred Logan, secretary of the Saint John Milk Dealers' Association, requesting that the milk dealers of Saint John have an opportunity to meet with the commission and discuss prices, etc. The commission will meet them in Saint John on Friday. The meeting here will continue tomorrow.

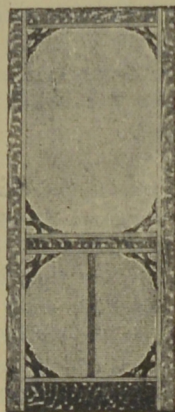

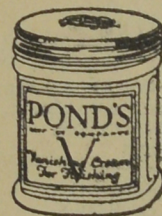
