Sept. 25th, 1935.

My dear Lady Perley,  
I find it very hard to put into words my feelings of deep gratitude for the perfectly beautiful Cup of Canadian Gold and workmanship which you, and some of the members of your Committee have presented to be on behalf of the Women of Canada.

It is very delightful that as a result of the generosity of the subscribers, you have also given presents to our three children. They are much honoured, most grateful and enchanted with the charming watches. I thank you very warmly on their behalf.

Tomorrow, alas, we leave Ottawa, where we all had such a happy home for nearly five years. **THREE MEN KILLED  
IN BALTIMORE**

BALTIMORE, Oct. 2—Three men were killed and several injured today in an explosion at a stone quarry on the outskirts of Baltimore.

Four men were seriously injured and were taken to hospitals here.

The blast occurred while the group of men were conducting an experiment with a new explosive. Two men, both of whom were killed, were putting the explosive into a drilled hole preparatory to setting it off with an electric current when the explosion occurred.

**POWER IS REFUSED  
BY ONTARIO HYDRO**

TORONTO, Ont., Oct. 2—The Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission did not accept delivery of 5,000 horsepower from the Gatineau Power Company and 67,000 horsepower from the Beauharnois Light, Heat and Power Co., scheduled to be delivered yesterday, it was announced.

T. Stewart Lyon, chairman of the commission, made no comment on the commission's refusal to accept the load contracted for by the former Henry Government.

The refusal was in line with the commission's policy since the Government of Premier Hepburn passed legislation giving it authority to cancel agreements with four Quebec power companies.

**BLACK SEA STORM  
FLOODS VILLAGE**

ISTANBUL, Oct. 2—More than 30 persons, including five women and three children, were drowned and 15 boats were wrecked in a heavy storm on the Black Sea and Northern Anatolia today.
