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## MUST STAY IN LEAGUE SAYS HEAD

TORONTO, Oct. 2.—St. Louis Eagles must continue to participate in National League play this winter or throw up their franchise, President Frank Calder ruled at the annual meeting of the league today.

Request for the suspension of the Eagles' franchise for one year made by Redmond Quain, club representative, was rejected at the meeting with the next move being left to the St. Louis club. Quain intimated that if the suspension was granted he would rent his players out to other teams in the loop.

### Offer Too Low

Quain further said he had been offered \$30,000 for his roster of 23 players but thought the offer too low. He had asked a sum not in excess of \$100,000 for his team, he said.

Transfer of the franchise of Les Canadiens Hockey Club of Montreal was accepted at the meeting. J. E. Savard was elected governor of the club to succeed Leo Dandurand. Dandurand's resignation was accepted with regrets.

### No Schedule

Because of the unsettled condition of the St. Louis problem, it was impossible to draw up a schedule of games for the season. The schedule will be arranged at a later date. The question of referees was left in the hands of President Calder.

## Famous Horse Retired

LONDON, Oct. 2.—Call Boy, winner of the Derby in 1927, who was bought by Sir H. Mallaby-Deeley some years ago for the record sum of \$300,000, is likely to end his days as a pet. The horse was retired to the stud but the result has been disappointing and the stud may be closed.

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## WORLD SERIES UNDER WAY AT DETROIT

Stands Packed as Cubs and Tigers Open Series at Detroit

DETROIT, Oct. 1.—The World Series, shaking off the chilling effects of an unwelcome blast of football weather, opens tomorrow in full panoply. It brings together Detroit Tigers, two-time American League champions, and Chicago Cubs, stretch-sensations of the National League pennant race, in an uproar of old-time rivalry.

Navin Field likely will be packed to its capacity of 48,700, a new high for the park, when the two lanky sharpshooters from Arkansas, Lynwood (Schoolboy) Rowe of the Tigers and Lonnie Warneke of the Cubs, unwrap their good right arms for a pitching duel that may add a bright chapter to baseball history.

Coach "Burdo" Burden of the Red and Black Squad is still trying to fill those ugly gaps made in the U. N. B. scrum by graduation. He is now plugging the holes with former backfield men. Among the most prominent of these is "Bud" McKnight, former Fredericton High School and City fullback and three quarter. McKnight's long 190-pound frame seems to fit in pretty well at lock as a balance to Don Jamer, veteran lock man of the Red and Black.

McKnight's star position is fullback where he excels in those long ground-gaining punts, but due to his weight he will be a great factor in balancing the forward pack, and if Burdo can inject some of that fighting spirit into his forwards, that he has injected into former U.N.B. scrums, he should have a hard-fighting, hard-hitting bunch of bruisers to match against Mt. A.

To build around the only remaining member of the 1934 three-quarter line Burdo has the finest collection of young ball carriers that has ever been turned out of this territory. Don Cogle, that galloping madman of last year's three-quarter line will probably have with him this year Don McKinnon, last year's Fredericton High School's captain, Cecil Coveney, well known three-quarter of High School and City, and Johnny Kilburn, sturdy sprinter from the same school. Harry Wilson, a tricky broken field runner of the Upper Canadian Football school, is another that has been showing signs of developing into a genuine U.N.B. three-quarter man. Although he has never played English Rugby before, he seems to be grasping the rudiments of the game and blending them with the knowledge of Canadian Rugby he learned while playing for McGill freshmen and Bishop's College. He has something there.

The latest report from the U.N.B. camp reveals that the Red and Black will go to battle next Saturday when they expect to meet the Saint John Trojans in Saint John. A return match will be played in Fredericton on the following Saturday. These will be the customary pre-season feeling-out games on which Burdo bases his opinions regarding the boys' ability.

Thanksgiving Day seems to be the choice for the opening of the N. B. Intercollegiate League, according to reports from the camp. It is expected that the Garnet and Gold squad will play here on that day, which is a Thursday (according to an old intercollegiate custom) and the Mt. A. aggregation will be at home to the U.N.B. boys on November 2nd.

Gossip around the University seems to indicate that the U.N.B. team will go after the McTier Cup this year. There is no reason why the old mug should not once more decorate the mantel at the University... except, possibly, for the old threat, Fredericton City.

Fredericton City, as usual, has not given the general public the least intimation that they are going to have a team this year, but, judging from past experience, we suppose that they will suddenly take the urge on or about the middle of October to have a team, and then go out, without practice, and trim everything in sight except Caledonia.

Speaking of Caledonia, we see where they are right up to form this year. They trimmed the Dominion No. 11 team last Saturday by the decisive score of 11-0. There have been many shakeups in the lineups of the two teams since last year, but the same spirit seems to prevail in the Caledonia team which took them on to victory and the Maritime championship last year. Following is an excerpt from the Halifax Chronicle story of the game.

"Both teams were considerably changed from last year's lineup. Caledonia had four of last year's intermediates, Alex. McDonald and Bob Wadman on the forward line, Herbie McNeil and Johnny "Grunts" McInnis in the back line, and Borden Stoddard, former Dalhousie man who played with Halifax Wanderers last year. The Caledonians changed their lineup in the second half, McInnis going to scrum half in place of Stoddard, "Coot" McLean was taken from the forward line, replacing Addie McIntyre, who went in the front line, Sheppard going fullback."

What we would like to see are some of those spirited games between Fredericton City and U.N.B. To our mind these two teams, in the past, have provided the rugby fans of Fredericton with the best rugby in this country. Where are all the sporting men of the town? Why don't they get behind the City team and provide the rugby-hungry Frederictonians with something to talk about.

At least one of the old City team is trying to drum up some rugby. He is Robin Kilburn. Robin wrote over to Mt. A. and engaged them for a game against Fredericton City over there on Saturday. He is now hustling around trying to gather up enough players to take with him. Hope he gets enough, because, regardless of his ability as a rugger, it would be more or less of an insult to the college team for City to put a one-man team on the field against them Saturday.
