The Government also said that the town of Mastung, 40 miles south of Quetta and nearby villages were reported razed and that four-fifths of Mastung's population were killed.

Almost the entire police force was eported to have been wiped out. British soldiers stationed at Quetta had to assume the task of policing thousands of disastrous refugees,

Most of the casualties occurred in the congested area of the city, where the houses, crumbled into the narrow streets, overwhelming the panicstricken resident as he fled, blotting out roadways and cutting off communication with the military and railroad stations.

The Government announced two British civil officers were killed with their wives and one with his motherin-law. It added that the bungalows of many officers were wrecked but, as far as it was known, the only casualties among officers of the military and Royal Air Force and their families were one point officer killed and a Flight-Lieutenant's child miss-
