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LIBERALS MET  
AT HAWKSHAW AND  
NEWMARKET

HAWKSHAW, York Co., May 31—  
A large meeting in the interests of the  
Liberal party was held in the Orange  
Hall here this evening when the chief  
speakers were John B. McNair, Fred-  
erickton, president of the New Brun-  
swick Liberal Association; Ernest W.  
Stairs, Lower Southamton, and Stu-  
art E. Durling, Canterbury, three of  
the York County candidates in the  
provincial election. Dr. J. G. Owens,  
Hawshaw, presided.

Speaking on free school books, Mr.  
Stairs said it was one of the serious  
problems confronting the people. Un-  
der Liberal rule free school books had  
been given up to Grade V; to get them  
past the 1930 election the government  
extended this boon to Grade VIII.

"Safely installed in office, the Con-  
servatives wiped out this sublime priv-  
ilege of free school books," said Mr.  
Stairs. "The Dysart government will  
give consideration to this problem."

NEWMARKET, York Co., May 31—  
John B. McNair, Fredericton, presi-  
dent of the New Brunswick Liberal  
Association, and Ernest W. Stairs, of  
Lower Southamton, two of the York  
County opposition candidates, were  
speakers here recently at a meeting  
held in the school house. Howard  
Dawson was chairman.

Mr. Stairs dealt especially with old  
age pensions, declaring that "the Con-  
servatives made a survey in 1930 and  
told the people old age pensions were  
to be put into effect. They had minis-  
ters tell the people that anyone wish-  
ing application forms could obtain  
such from them. They went so far  
as to pass an Act dealing with old age  
pensions, but made it non-effective un-  
til proclaimed. They went to the  
people and were victorious, but they  
never repealed the Act or never pro-  
claimed it. The Liberal government  
will proclaim it."

Board of Health  
Will Take Action  
Re Sewerage

At the regular monthly meeting of  
the Fredericton Sub-District Board of  
Health, held last evening, a report was  
made that approximately 35 houses in  
the city have no sewerage connection.  
Decision was made by the Board to  
take immediate action, and next week  
information will be laid against the  
owners. In this connection notice had  
been given that all connections were  
to have been made by June 1.

Dr. J. M. Campbell, district medical  
health officer, occupied the chair, and  
there was a full attendance of mem-  
bers. Reports were received. The  
sanitary inspector will complete his  
annual inspection of the city within  
the next two weeks. The plumbing  
inspector reported more plumbing  
work done in the last month than  
at any time during the past two  
years. The report of the analyst  
showed milk to be good. Alex. Flem-  
ing, sanitary inspector, further report-  
ed that in cases where citizens had  
been ordered to clean up their prem-  
ises that the work had been done.  
One case of scarlet fever was report-  
ed; three cases of measles, and one  
case of chicken pox.

Vita statistics showed 28 deaths  
during May, seven marriages, and 28  
births. The number of deaths had  
been the most in several months.

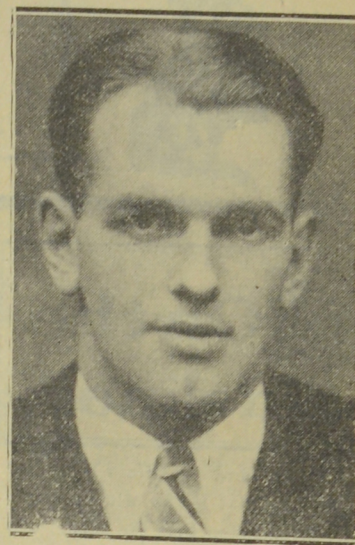

ed by British military and civilian ser-  
vants of all ranks.

Direct communications are non-ex-  
istent. There is no way of getting  
any news from Quetta except frag-  
mentary reports being picked up from  
the official radio which is confining  
itself to essential messages concern-  
ing relief and is not carrying general  
news.

Early fears of starvation were ban-  
ished when it was found that the food  
supplies are adequate for the present  
and the railroads and highways are  
still passable.

One train left Karachi at five p.m.  
with doctor and nurses—many of  
them volunteers—medical supplies  
and railroad telegraph repair gangs.  
The military and the Royal Air Force  
also sent relief parties.

A railroad official who came by  
rail-motor from Quetta to Spezand  
reported that the railroad headquar-  
ters at Quetta had been devastated  
and that many of the railroad per-  
sonnel were killed when their quar-  
ters crashed.

The Government of India announc-  
ed at twenty or thirty members of the  
Royal Air Force at Quetta were re-  
ported missing, in addition to the 44  
killed.

The Government also said that the  
town of Mastung, 40 miles south of  
Quetta and nearby villages were re-  
ported razed and that four-fifths of  
Mastung's population were killed.

Almost the entire police force was  
reported to have been wiped out. Brit-  
ish soldiers stationed at Quetta had  
to assume the task of policing thou-  
sands of disastrous refugees.

Most of the casualties occurred in  
the congested area of the city, where  
the houses, crumbled into the narrow  
streets, overwhelming the panic-  
stricken resident as he fled, blotting  
out roadways and cutting off com-  
munication with the military and rail-  
road stations.

The Government announced two  
British civil officers were killed with  
their wives and one with his mother-  
in-law. It added that the bungalows  
of many officers were wrecked but,  
as far as it was known, the only  
casualties among officers of the mili-  
tary and Royal Air Force and their  
families were one point officer killed  
and a Flight-Lieutenant's child miss-  
ing.
