Education by Radio

Here is a pioneering radio venture that may be the beginning of big things. Education for pupils at school and for the folks at home is to be a regular radio program. The Board of Education in several of the United States, authorizes it.

Probably no better medium exists for far reaching instruction and the adoption of teaching methods to its peculiar requirements should be carefully studied by experts. The business of getting facts to radio listeners is so new that many mistakes occur in it.

The faults develop largely through bringing to the radio the practices that may be all right in other institutions. Radio teachers will do well to keep in mind that the context of their instructions, the bare facts, are the all-important things. The tricks of oratory, the little human weaknesses displayed sometimes in the pulpit, on the platform and in the school room may be erective in their places, but the radio has no use for them.

Nowhere else is the time element so great importance. The minutely synchronized system of the radio permits no long-winded program liberties. The start and stop are at the drop of the hat, or rather at the inexorable blink of a light that flashes a time signal across continents.

The success of radio instruction will depend on stripping the message of frills, logical marshaling of facts, aiming straight at a well-defined purpose and keeping a careful correlation attainment of the entire course.

To Present Special Programme of Kreisler's "Old Masters"

Because of the wide interest created among music lovers by the published statement of Fritz Kreisler, world famous violinist, that he is the real composer of a series of works hitherto credited to a number of the old masters, the Columbia Broadcasting System will present a special half-hour broadcast tonight, from 5:45 to 6:15 P.M., A.S.T., including some of these much-discussed compositions. The contributing artists will be John Corigliano, violinist, and Alexander Semmler, pianist. Pitts Sanborn, the prominent music critic, will comment upon the disclosure and the selections.

According to recently published accounts, when Kreisler was a young man he created music in the style of such noted composers as Vivaldi, Porpora, Couperin, Pugnani, and Padre Martini, and passed them as transcriptions of manuscripts of these old masters. For thirty years they were accepted as the music of the 17th and 18th century composers. But the other day, the new catalogue of Fisher, Inc., music publishers, described Kreisler himself as the author of these works. A cable from Vienna said that the celebrated violinist admitted he was the composer, and quoted him that "necessity forced this course on me thirty years ago, when I was desirous of enlarging my programs. I found it inexpedient and tactless to repeat my name endlessly on the programs."
