the human jaw.

"The starch for the ideal type of dental arches runs counter to even the most normal natural tendencies and hense is foredoomed to failure", the scientist declared. "Whatever feature, whatever character and whatever function of the human body may be taken we find that even under the most normal conditions nature does not proceed along a narrow path of uniformity but along a broad avenue of variation.

"Whatever ideal concerning the teeth or arches or jaws may be setup, there must be made an allowance of from 20 to 40 per cent. of the average for the normal variation of such an ideal.

"Besides this normal variation, there is noticeable also, in many if not all the more definite features of the human organisms, a tendency toward a segregation into more than one type. Thus, even under the most normal conditions we are confronteo on every side and in every feature of the teeths and jaws with the fact of extensive variability".

Dr. Hrdlicka explained that his conclusions were based on a study of skeletons dating to 3,500 B. C. He pointed out that perfect development. of the jaw and teeth was "seledom realized". He cited three main causes of imperfect development: retardation of eruption of some teeth, sickness and other factors that cause serious. disturbances in the blood supply, and hereditary factors of a disharmonious
