

NEW DICTATOR IN THE BALKANS, BORIS OF BULGARIA MAKES SELF MIGHTY POWER AT SOFIA

VIENNA, Austria, June 21—A new it does appear that Boris has again King-Dictator is emerging today in consolidated his position against the Balkans.

He is King Boris, 41 year old monarch, who according to authority of the crown. Colonel Damjan Veltcheff and Colonel Georgheff are supposedly the leaders of the Bulgarian republican movement, while Professor Tsankoff is credited with a desire to form a fascist state in Bulgaria.

At the beginning of the present year, Boris was almost a prisoner in his own palace. He was surrounded by hostile republican army officers, who were slowly usurping his authority.

Then in quick came two bloodless cabinet changes and from both King Boris emerged stronger and more popular. His throne, which looked so shaky under the republican storm of recent months, now appears comparatively well buttressed by staunch supporters.

King Boris, through his new premier Professor Andre Toscheff, has announced the preparation of a new constitution for Bulgaria which, it is believed, will reduce the control exercised by the army generals over political affairs.

Long Negotiations

Bulgaria's newest cabinet, formed on April 11, was only obtained after most difficult, and dangerous negotiations. The representatives of the Army League, who have virtually controlled the country for years, insisted on dominating the new cabinet. Although it finally took only three portfolios in the government, the Army League still remains the dominant factor in the new cabinet, but the league's representatives are considered loyal to Boris.

It is one of the contradictions of Balkan politics that before the recent cabinet change could be carried through, two former Bulgarian premiers, Kimon Georgheff and Prof. Alexander Tsankoff had to be arrested and imprisoned on the Black Sea.

It also was an irony of fate that ex-premier Georgheff was imprisoned on a charge of breaking a law which he himself had decreed shortly less than a year before.

Non-Party System

Still more, curiously the new government has pledged itself to continue the new non-party system inaugurated by Georgheff in May 1919.

These are but random examples of the complexities of Bulgarian and Balkan politics.

Neutral Civilian

Professor Toscheff, it is reported here, heads the new government because he represents the "neutral civilian" whom the King has been seeking to relieve Bulgaria of the curse of an army-ruled cabinet. Toscheff was a diplomat in Stambul and Vienna for a number of years, and on his retirement became a professor in the Military College where he made friendly contacts with the generals. He also devoted much time to writing, notably two books on the Balkan wars.

The new premier has participated in several inter-Balkan conferences, and is known for his ardent support of the rights of the Macedonian minorities living in Yugoslavia and Greece.

His activities on behalf of the Macedonians, it is believed, is one explanation why Toscheff, an ex-diplomat, did not take the portfolio of foreign affairs. King Boris, it is reported, did not wish to impair the improved relations with Yugoslavia by again injecting the Macedonian question into Bulgaria's foreign relations.

Aegean Sea Question

The ministry of foreign affairs was turned over to George Gossiecanoff, who is known to favor a rapprochement with Yugoslavia. It is not generally believed, however, that Bulgaria's new government will sponsor Bulgaria's entrance into the Balkan pact which would automatically mean the abandonment of her claims to an access to the Aegean sea.

Bulgaria is a tiny kingdom of slightly more than 39,000 square miles, fettered politically, economically and militarily by the treaty of Neuilly (1919). Its population of slightly more than 6,000,000 is wholeheartedly behind the government's claim to military equality now that Germany has scrapped the treaty of Versailles.

HOW TO MARK YOUR BALLOTS

Several Important Matters To Remember On Election Day

Following are directions to the voters as to how to mark their ballots in the provincial election on June 27. Voters are reminded that the ballot is secret, and no matter what you may be told there is no way for anyone except yourself to know how you vote. Any distinguishing mark placed on a ballot invalidates it.

The elector is given an envelope on the back of which the deputy returning officer shall mark his initials in ink. He then retires to a separate compartment of the polling booth, marks his ballot and places it in the envelope, returning the same to the returning officer, who in the presence of the elector deposits it in the ballot box.

Ballots may be printed or written the back of which the deputy returning officer, or may be partly written and partly printed. DO NOT place crosses against the names of the candidates for whom you desire to vote. If you wish to "split" your vote strike out the name of the candidates for whom you are not voting and write on the ballot the name of the candidate you wish to add.

NORM THEORY HELD DOUBTFUL

Nature Runs to Variation, Anthrological Authority Says

NEW YORK, N. Y., June 22— In building the jaw and other features of the human face nature knows no such thing as the ideal normal type, Dr. Ales Hrdlicka, curator of physical anthropology of the Smithsonian Institution, told the American Society of Orthodontists.

Dr. Hrdlicka, one of the leading anthropologists of the world, told the orthodontists that "extensive variability" rather than ideal normality seemed to mark the natural development of the human jaw.

"The starch for the ideal type of dental arches runs counter to even the most normal natural tendencies and hence is foredoomed to failure", the scientist declared. "Whatever feature, whatever character and whatever function of the human body may be taken we find that even under the most normal conditions nature does not proceed along a narrow path of uniformity but along a broad avenue of variation."

"Whatever ideal concerning the teeth or arches or jaws may be set up, there must be made an allowance of from 20 to 40 per cent. of the average for the normal variation of such an ideal."

"Besides this normal variation, there is noticeable also, in many if not all the more definite features of the human organisms, a tendency toward a segregation into more than one type. Thus, even under the most normal conditions we are confronted on every side and in every feature of the teeth and jaws with the fact of extensive variability."

Dr. Hrdlicka explained that his conclusions were based on a study of skeletons dating to 3,500 B. C. He pointed out that perfect development of the jaw and teeth was "scarcely realized". He cited three main causes of imperfect development: retardation of eruption of some teeth, sickness and other factors that cause serious disturbances in the blood supply, and hereditary factors of a disharmonious nature.
