### THAT WOULD BE NEWS

### URUGUAY'S TROUBLES

The attempted assassination of President Terra of Uruguay, which is a country not particularly given to such carryings-on, is suggestive of a practical lesson in the science of government.

Until 1933, Uruguay, of all countries in the world, had a constitution most carefully designed to prevent usurpation of the executive power by a dictator. In this respect it far outshone the famous balance of powers in the American Constitution.

The Uruguayan document was not content merely to balance the Legislature against the Executive, and the Judiciary against both of them, but also split the executive power between the President and an Administrative Council, the latter popularly elected for rotative terms. The President appointed the ministers of War and Marine, thus controlling the Army and Navy—but the Administrative Council controlled the Finance ministry and therefore held the power of the purse over the military end of the Government.

This elaborate arrangement worked very well indeed until the depression and then, in 1933, it simply proved too elaborate and President Terra met the emergency, which was a real one, by dismissing the Council, dissolving Parliament and gathering all the reins into his own hands. His move at the time enjoyed popular support and its success was pretty good evidence that no system of government, however safeguarded, can be wholly secure against revolution and dictatorship whenever the public gets the idea that such drastic action is warranted.

Now it seems the Uruguayan public again is become restive. Terra's would-be assassin was a former member of Parliament, desirous of restoring normal government.

## ST. ANDREW'S CELEBRATES FOUR ANNIVERSARIES

Saint Andrew's Presbyterian Church will have an eventful day tomorrow. At morning and evening services four anniversaries will be celebrated—the Diamond Jubilee of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, which was constituted on the 15th day of June 1875; the Tenth Anniversary since the Disruption of 1925; the Eighth Anniversary of the dedication of the present church edifice; and the One Hundredth and Third year since the organization of the first Presbyterian congregation in Fredericton.

Rev. Dr. Ross will officiate at both services, taking as his text in the morning, "The Lord hath done great things for us whereof we are glad," and in the evening, "Make your Calling and Election Sure."

The choir, under the direction of Mr. Robin Bayley, organist, will render special anniversary music. A Jubilee Offering of \$3,000 will be received. A spirit of optimism and progress characterizes all departments of the congregation, and tomorrow will be worthy of the many anniversaries Presbyterians in Fredericton have observed.

### A BIG DEMONSTRATION IN WOODSTOCK

We would like to mention, through the columns of your paper, of a big celebration held in Woodstock on May 23, which Rev. H. S. Dow describes in his paper "The King's Highway."

"There were scores of trucks bringing in men who were working on the highway road. The same editor was told that those men were given free trip into town, also paid for their full day."

"At the Carlisle Hotel several sleek smiling fellows were going through the crowd sending thirsty ones upstairs to rooms where those who wished might receive a parcel, the contents of which might be judged by their actions. This same editor says "it was a great demonstration of government control of intoxicating liquor."

"This same editor asks who will pay for all this liquor so freely given away, and pay those hundreds of men who left their work to come to this great demonstration, commenting that no doubt the already over-burdened taxpayer will be able to answer these questions next year."

From other reliable sources we learned it was a regular drunken "orgy" one of the most disgraceful ever seen in Woodstock and this government who boasted of liquor control giving away free liquor to make men and boys drunk.

We also noticed in a previous issue of the Gleaner a statement by John B. McNair saying that when this party was elected before, this same activity was in full force till election but the day after their picks and shovels stood idly by the road side.

We hope the intelligent electorate of this province will not be deceived by this "flash in the pan" just before election, but will give the Opposition a chance to make good their promise of lowering the salaries of public officials which is at present all out of reason in comparison with conditions in the country, and with what the labouring man can earn.

rate, it is clear that Canada's constitution stands badly in need of overhauling if it is to enable Canadians to govern themselves effectively in an industrial age, and especially in the economic uncertainties of the present world."

Prof. McKay suggested that there was a possibility the Canadian constitution may be more difficult to amend than the American, and pointed out the "danger of vested interests rallying to the side of the provinces in the case of any proposed change of the constitution which would give the Federal Government more power over business—a danger, I gather, that exists on the American side as well."

## KIDNAPPER GETS 45-YEAR SENTENCE

TACOMA, Wash., June 22—Mr. and Mrs. Harmon M. Waley pleaded guilty to kidnapping and extortion charges today for the kidnapping of George Weyerhaeuser and Waley was immediately sentenced to 45 years in prison. Judge E. E. Cushman refused to accept Mrs. Waley's plea.

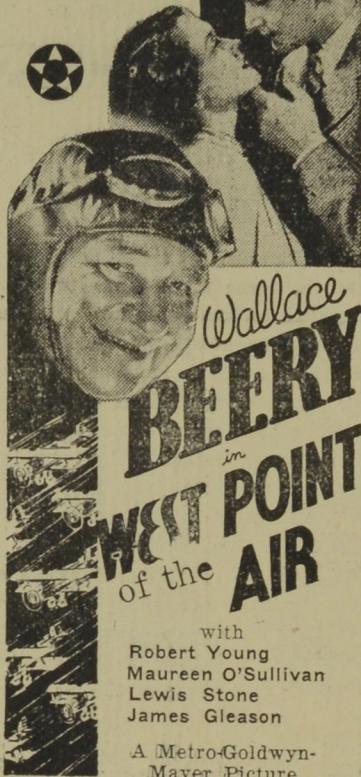

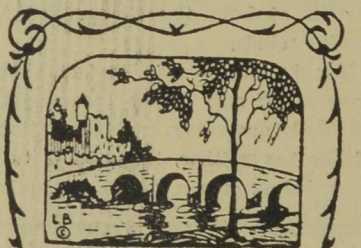
