fore he it resolved, "That the Dept. of Education be requested to urge local Boards of Education to appoint qualified physicians both men and women to address the high school boys and girls, giving preventive and guiding instruction on health problems of adolescence."

Resolutions relative to music teaching in the schools is also being presented by their Federation.

Professor F. Clarke, of the Faculty of Education, McGill University, in an address given at a meeting of the New Education Fellowship in Toronto, recently spoke of the "New Institute of Education," to be set up in London, England.

In this regard the National Federation is urging the provincial federations of Home and School Associations to contribute towards the formation of a "Canadian Institute of Education," by a study of the problems in their respective provinces. Every province in Canada is represented on the National Federation of Home and School Associations except Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick. What is the matter with New Brunswick? Why is it lacking in this respect? Why is this organization so little known in New Brunswick? The Home and School Association of Fredericton is endeavoring to promote the work in New Brunswick by distributing literature and information from the Canadian Federation office.

The National Bulletin contains copies of resolutions from the various provinces active in the Home and School Movement, which will be considered at the Vancouver conference in July and from which items of interest were read at the meeting.

U. S. PUBLISHER LAUDS FREE PRESS OF BRITISH EMPIRE

Maintenance of Democracy Due Largely To This Factor, Says H. B. Johnson.

CANTON, New York, June 22—Maintenance of democracy in Great Britain was due largely to insistence that there be a free press, Harold B. Johnson, Watertown, New York, publisher told the conference on Canadian-American affairs at St. Lawrence University here last night.

"It is one of the strongest principles of British Empire government policy," said Mr. Johnson. "There is a mutual strengthening of the steady influence of Britain and the United States today by reason of our common understanding of the benefits of the free and honest press to insure the perpetuity of free institutions."

Mr. Johnson paid tribute to the manner in which political battles were fought out so thoroughly in the press of Canada and expressed admiration for "the full information and the comment that is carried to the citizenship by Dominion newspapers".

TREMENDOUS ADVANTAGES

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 22 — "Newspaper advertising has tremendous advantages over other forms of advertising," Premier T. D. Pattullo stated today in connection with the Dominion-wide advertisement this week-end with which British Columbia is presenting its case for a changed relationship between province and Dominion.

"A newspaper advertisement," said the premier, "possesses stability and permanence. It can be studied at leisure, analyzed and followed up intelligently by discussion. The printed word cannot very well be contorted, and possibility of misconception is minimized".
