International Audience Will Hear French-Canadian Music

A program of French-Canadian mu sic will be the feature of the Canadian Grenadier Guards' broadcast from the Canadian Radio Commission's Montreal studios at 6:00 P. M., A. S. T., on Sunday, June 23. The program will dedicated to St. Jean-Baptiste, in whose honour will be the French-Canadian National Feast Day. Some of the composers whose music will be heard during the broadcast will be Rosario Bourdon, a Canadian orchestra leader at present stationed in the United States; Dr. J. J. Gagnier the Commission's Montreal musical director; Calixa Lavelle, who wrote the music for "O Canada"; Captain Charles O'Neill, of the famous 22nd Regiment of Quebec City; Joseph Vezina, and Ernest Lavigne, who is still remembered by a great many Montrealers as the "magnetic director" of the Sohmer Park programs.

The following selections will be heard during the broadcast, which is not only fed to the coast-to-coast network of the Canadian Radio Commission but also to the networks of the National Broadcasting Company in the United States:
