DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

The Women's Institute in session at Carleton County yesterday advocated the changing of our Provincial Educational System and some action on the report made by an Educational Commission appointed by the Tilley Government some four or five years ago.

The changes advocated are along the same lines as have been suggested by The Daily Mail.

It is the general opinion that some change should be made in the Educational System and that the Board of Education should be composed of men who are practical educationalists, with a Minister of Education who is also a practical educationalist, at its head.

"A Minister of Education should be an even more important factor in the life of the community than a minister of highways or lands," says the Toronto Mail and Empire, and it is right.

The Educational Commission made a report some years ago and nothing was ever done except to pigeonhole the report. It is now probable that the Provincial Government when it can get a chance to square things up, will take some action in regard to this as well as in regard to the departmental affairs in general. It has long needed an overhauling.

### WAR THREATS

If negotiations for a settlement of the Ethiopian question fail, the next step is up to the Council of the League of Nations, which meets at Geneva, September 4. What diplomatic moves are now going on few people know. Premier Laval of France is reported to be at work on some sort of plan, and it may well be supposed that statesmen of other nations are submitting their views to one another. Great Britain is surely working to achieve unity at Geneva, not with the view of coercing Italy but of preventing war and saving the League.

On the Italian side, events are shaping themselves satisfactorily to Mussolini. He has so maneuvered the Uualal arbitration that the arbitrators are almost certain to bring in a verdict that in that incident Ethiopians were the aggressors. The question whether Italian were trespassing on Ethiopian territory has been ruled out in advance. If the verdict is rendered according to the forecasts, then Italy is entitled to satisfaction. She does not believe that an unanimous vote of the Council can be obtained against her, especially if she has not actually proceeded to war before the date of the meeting.

That position may be hard to assail legally, and Great Britain realizes the fact. Therefore, whatever is done by the Council about Uualal the British want the League to agree on a program of sanctions against any violator of the Covenant at any time. And on that question there is likely to develop an even greater difference of opinion in the Council, especially since on that issue Italy will have a vote. Mussolini has played his game with great skill and apparently has foreseen every move; at least, every move that has been taken so far.

There is, however, one move that Mussolini has apparently neglected—a movement of British public opinion which may compel John Bull to take action independent of the League, for the protection of British interests, which are considered jeopardized by a war in Ethiopia. And the best way to stir British public opinion to the fever point is to allow the Italian press to threaten war if Great Britain takes any action which Italy may regard as unfriendly. This can only lead to the filling of the Mediterranean with the British fleet, to protect the Suez Canal and Malta, and be ready for any eventuality.

During the next ten days there will be much movement behind the scenes of which, it is likely, the public will know little more than the diplomats want told.

One thing is certain—nobody wants war except Mussolini, and he wants it merely in Ethiopia. Therefore the rumors of a general conflict, in case Duce goes forward with his plans, must be heavily discounted.

The chances are that in spite of any British efforts the League of Nations will stultify itself once more, and try to find another "formula" to save its face. That is what Mussolini, who knows his League, counting on.

the point where others might agree with the Italian definition of "colonial enterprise". If Italian action may be considered an armed penetration of Ethiopia which seeks only to insure the safety of border colonies and Italians who desire to settle in Ethiopia, Laval is of opinion it need not embroil Europe and cause the League of Nations to lose face through failure to settle the problem by peaceful means.
