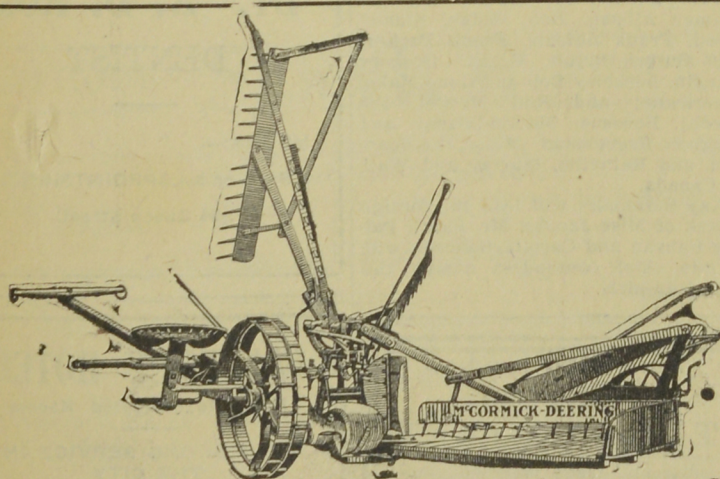

ITALY'S FINANCES ARE NO BARRIER TO LONG CAMPAIGN

ROME Italy, Aug. 28—Italy's financial condition permits her to contemplate waging war indefinitely—whether in Africa or Europe—informed sources asserted last night.

This conviction was based on words recently attributed to Premier Mussolini's asserting the Italian people have already so proven their willingness for self-sacrifice that they could come through any contingency.

The informed sources explained, however, that Italy does not expect to have to support a prolonged campaign in East Africa. They believed that if war comes it will be a question of one gigantic assault, followed by possible guerilla engagements during occupation of the empire.

Italy has a gold reserve of approximately 5,000,000,000 lira which has fluctuated only slightly due to government control. A little less than 1,000,000,000 lira have been spent already for Italy's East African campaign.
