

REGULATIONS FOR BETTER TAXI SERVICE

Marysville Taxi Drivers in Special Meeting Last Evening

New Rates Proposed

Passengers Not To Be Kept Waiting Unreasonable Length of Time

A meeting of the taxi drivers of Marysville was held last evening at seven o'clock in the police station there with ten drivers present, also Aldermen Sloat, Moore and Pettigrove, Nelson Pond of Marysville acted as chairman.

The object of the meeting was to regulate and organize the taxi service between Marysville and Fredericton. Several regulations were brought up and discussed. Motion to have them passed was made by William Brown and seconded by Maurice Morton.

It is planned as preliminary regulations to have at least two taxis at each end of the route; to always load the first car in line; and to see that no driver shall keep a passenger waiting longer than thirty minutes, time to start when passenger gets into car.

Tentative Rates

Tentative rates drawn up were as follows: rate from Marysville to Devon or Fredericton, 15 cents; passengers wishing to be driven past Ryan's Corner, 10 cents; rate from Fredericton to R. Manzer's store, 15 cents; beyond Manzer's store, 20 cents; rate from Fredericton to Rollingtown Bridge 25 cents; school children, \$1 per week; special trip, when person isn't willing to wait thirty minutes, 50 cents.

During the week of the Fredericton exhibition the rate from Marysville, for adults will be 20 cents and for children, 15 cents.

A resolution was passed that the taxi rates be published in the newspapers and that cards be printed with the prices and put up in the taxis. Ald. Horace Pettigrove was asked to try to secure permission for the taxi drivers to carry taxi signs in the right hand corner of their windshields. The meeting closed leaving the chairman, Nelson Pond, of Marysville with authority to call another meeting when he thought it advisable.

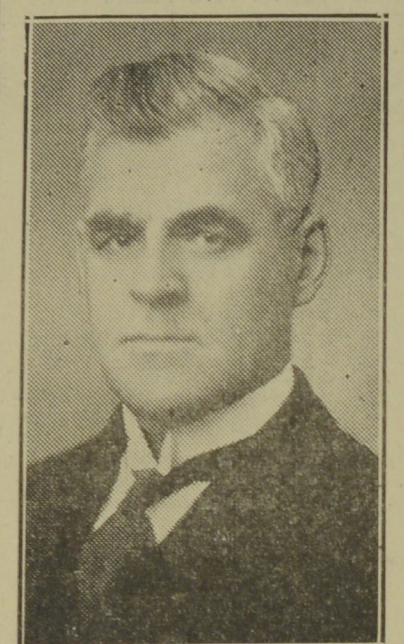
DYSART WILL GIVE SCHOOL BOOKS AFTER SESSION

Law Under Which They Were Given Free Was Repealed in 1933

Former Law Abused

Children Will Be Taught to Take Care of School Books

Legislative authority is necessary before the Provincial Government will be able to give free school books, and it will be impossible to secure that legislation for the opening of the present school year, because the Legislature will not meet until away along in the winter. It is absolutely

the intention of the government to make free school books available as soon as the legislative authority can be obtained.

It was pointed out today by the premier that "legislation under which free distribution of school books was made heretofore was repealed at the session of 1933." Free school books will, therefore, not be available this year, he said.

He indicated that in the meantime steps are being taken to investigate and study various existing systems in the various provinces of Canada, as well as certain states of the republic, with a view to setting up in this province "a scheme which, it is hoped may prove to be a vast improvement over the system in vogue heretofore."

"It is generally conceded that our former system was both wasteful and extravagant, and tended to engender undesirable habits in the youth of our province, and furthermore, to destroy those habits of thrift and regard for the property of others which should be inculcated, encouraged and fostered," Premier Dysart stated.

School books for the coming year have already been supplied dealers throughout the province under existing legislation, and may be obtained in the usual way, he said.

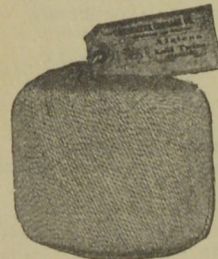

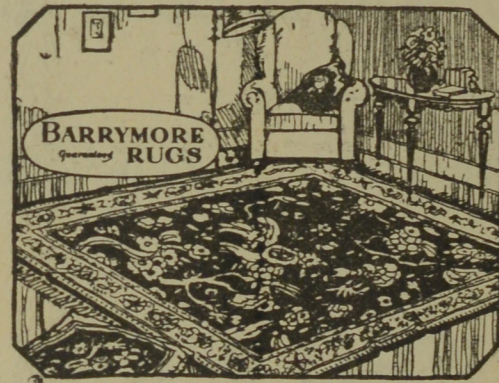
