## Yards of Eels are Going to Germany

MONTREAL, P. Q., Nov. 8.—Can-  
adian eels—yards and yards of them,  
miles of them, so many in fact that  
if placed end to end they would turn a  
Hollywood statistician green with  
envy—are leaving Montreal today in  
the Canadian Pacific fast cargo liner  
Beaverford. In about two weeks,  
cut into millions of small pieces,  
they will be melting in the mouths of  
German gourmets.

Hundreds of tons of eels, taken from  
the mud in the St. Lawrence off the  
Isle of Orleans near Quebec are  
shipped to Germany each year. The  
business reaches a peak at this sea-  
son and today's shipment on the  
Beaverford will probably be a record  
one as actually one hundred tons  
weight of barrelled eels will leave in  
the Hamburg-bound liner.

Hardy individuals, it is claimed that  
the eels though frozen are still alive  
in the barrels, but do not show signs  
of life. It might, he said that they are  
hibernating. Aboard ship they are  
placed in refrigerator space having a  
temperature of 20 below zero, which  
probably induces a chronic state of  
hibernation. The Canadian eels form  
part of a cargo of over 6,000 tons  
weight the Beaverford is taking to  
London and Hamburg.
